service for a longer consecutive period than two weeks; nor be kept on duty continuously longer than ten hours in the day *shift, body or platoon*, or fourteen hours in the night *shift, body or platoon*, excepting as may be necessary to equalize the hours of duty and service, and also excepting in cases of riot, serious conflagration, or other such emergency, as above provided: Provided, however, That this act shall not apply to employes who are employed subject to call.

AN ACT

Lapsing all unexpended or unencumbered balances of appropriations from the general fund made by the General Assembly at its session of one thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven and prior sessions.

Section 1. Be it enacted, &c., That all unexpended or unencumbered balances of appropriations made from the General Fund of the State Treasury, by the General Assembly at the session thereof held in the year one thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven, or at any session prior thereto, which shall remain unexpended or unencumbered on the thirty-first day of May, one thousand nine hundred and thirty-one, shall lapse upon that date.

AN ACT

For the observance of General Pulaski's Memorial Day.

Preamble.

Whereas, The eleventh day of October, one thousand seven hundred and seventy-nine, is the date in American history of the heroic death of Brigadier General Casimir Pulaski, who died from wounds received on October ninth, one thousand seven hundred and seventy-nine, at the siege of Savannah, Georgia; and

Whereas, The states of Indiana, Wisconsin, Michigan, Ohio, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, New York, Minnesota, Maryland, New Jersey, Illinois, Rhode Island, New Hampshire, Nebraska, and other states, by legislative enactment designated October eleventh, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-nine, to be General Pulaski's Memorial Day; and

Whereas, It is fitting that the recurring anniversary of this day be commemorated with suitable, patriotic and public exercises in observing and commemorating the death of this American hero of the Revolutionary War; therefore,

Section 1. Be it enacted, &c., That the Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania shall annually issue a proclamation calling upon officials of the Government to display the flag of the United States on all governmental buildings on October eleventh of each year, and invite the people of the Commonwealth to observe the day, in the schools, churches and other suitable places, with appropriate ceremonies in commemoration of the death of General Casimir Pulaski.

AN ACT

To amend section five of the act, approved the seventh day of May, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-three (Pamphlet Laws, one hundred fifty-eight), entitled "An act creating a Legislative Reference Bureau; providing for the election of a director by the General Assembly; designating the officers and employes of such bureau; defining their duties; fixing their salaries; abolishing the present Legislative Reference Bureau; and making an appropriation," as amended, by defining the powers of the director with respect to the employes of the bureau, and their salaries.

Section 1.
