RESOLUTION

Respecting the Tariff.

WHEREAS, protecting duties are in strict conformity to Preamble. the spirit and letter of the constitution of the United States, tend eventually to lower the prices of goods, encourage agriculture by creating a home market, give employment to our own citizens in our own country, instead of maintaining the subjects of foreign nations, increase commerce by extending internal trade, and by affording articles of export, preserve public morals by substituting industry for idleness: And whereas, under the operation of the tariff, the nation has enjoyed an unexampled degree of prosperity, which can only be perpetuated by a steadfast support of the system: Therefore,

A SUPPLEMENT

To a resolution relative to Isaac Lynn, passed January twenty-fourth, eighteen hundred and thirty-two.

Preamble.

WHEREAS, doubts are entertained by the Auditor General, of his authority to settle and adjust the claim of Isaac Lynn, under the resolution of the twenty-fourth January, eighteen hundred and thirty-two: Therefore,

Resolved, by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the State Treasurer be and he is hereby directed to pay Captain Isaac Lynn, of Fayette county, the sum of one hundred three dollars and eighty-four cents, in full, for monies expended by him in marching his company of militia from Brownsville, in Fayette county, to Erie, in Pennsylvania, in the year eighteen hundred and thirteen.
