AN ACT

For the relief of sundry soldiers and widows of soldiers of the revolutionary war.

SECT. 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the State Treasurer be, and he is hereby authorized and required to pay to Peter Myers, of York county, a soldier of the revolutionary war, or to his order, the sum of forty dollars immediately, and an annuity of forty dollars, payable half yearly, during life, to commence on the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-three.

\$40 grat. and ann. granted to P. Myers.

SECT. 2. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That the State Treasurer be, and he is hereby authorized and required to pay to Frederick Bodine, of Lycoming county, and Thomas Deeds, of Montgomery county, soldiers, and to Martha Ross, of Chester county, the widow of a soldier of the revolutionary war, or to their respective orders, the sum of forty dollars to each, immediately, in full for their services.

\$40 grat. to F. Bodine, T. Deeds, and Martha Ross.

SECT. 3. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That the State Treasurer be, and he is hereby authorized and required to pay unto William Clark, of Bedford county, and John German, of Berks county, soldiers of the revolutionary war, or to their orders, respectively, the sum of forty dollars each, immediately, and an annuity of forty dollars each, during life, payable half yearly, to commence on the

first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-three.

SECT. 4. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That the State Treasurer be, and he is hereby authorized and required to pay unto Sarah Seals, of Greene county, and Mary Miller, of Centre county, widows of revolutionary soldiers, or to their respective orders, the sum of forty dollars to each, immediately, and an annuity of forty dollars to each, during life, payable half yearly, to commence on the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-three.

AN ACT

To prevent obstructions being placed on turnpike roads.

SECT. 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That from and after the first day of September next, any turnpike company who shall permit large and unbroken stones, or heaps of stones which may endanger the passage of any wagon, stage, or other carriage, to remain on the paved or artificial parts of their respective roads for a period exceeding twenty-four hours after information being given that such obstructions do exist, shall be liable to pay a fine not exceeding forty dollars, nor less than ten dollars, for every such offence, to be recovered on conviction thereof before any justice of the peace of the proper county, as debts of like amount are by law recoverable, with costs of suit, the one half to the use of the prosecutor, and the other half to and for the repair of the roads within the township where such obstructions are found.

Turnpike companies liable to a penalty from & after the 1st September, for offence, Recovery and appropriation.
