

SECT. 2. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That the said commissioners and inhabitants shall be bound to keep at their own expense, so much of the said turnpike road as is hereby ceded to them, under the provisions of this act, in perfect and complete order and repair: and that so soon as the said commissioners and inhabitants of the Kensington district aforesaid, shall pave or cause to be paved, as streets are now usually paved, so much of the said turnpike road hereby ceded and relinquished to them, as is included between the south western line of the said Kensington district and Masters street, then the president, managers and company of the Frankford and Bristol turnpike road aforesaid, shall thenceforth cease to ask, demand and receive tolls for so much of the said road as is within the limits of the said Kensington district, and shall within one month thereafter, remove all gates, cranes, or other obstructions erected or placed by them across the said turnpike road south of the lane known by the name of the Hart lane.

SECT. 3. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That so much of any act of Assembly, as is hereby altered or supplied, be and the same is hereby repealed.

AN ACT

For the relief Jonathan King, Joseph Wood, Ephraim Williams, John Ireland, George Lanenberger and Samuel Spicer, soldiers of the revolutionary war.

SECT. 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the State Treasurer be and he is hereby authorized and required to pay to Jonathan King of Armstrong county, Joseph Wood of Mifflin county, Ephraim Williams and S. Spicer.

AN ACT

To incorporate the Philadelphia Society for alleviating the miseries of Public Prisons.

SECT. 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That all and every the persons who shall at the time of the passing of this act, be members of the society called "The Philadelphia society for alleviating the miseries of public prisons," shall be and they are hereby created and declared to be one body politic and corporate, by the name, style and title of "The Philadelphia society for alleviating the miseries of public prisons," and by the same name shall have perpetual succession, and shall be able to sue and be sued, implead and be impleaded in all courts of record or elsewhere, and to take, receive, hold and enjoy, by purchase, grant, devise or bequest to them and their successors, lands, tenements, rents, annuities, franchises, hereditaments, goods and chattles of what nature, kind or quality soever, real, personal or mixed, or choses in action, and the same, from time to time, to sell, grant, devise, alien or dispose of: *Provided,* That the clear yearly value or income of the necessary houses, lands and tenements, rents, annuities, or other hereditaments and real estate of the said corporation, and the interest of money by it lent, shall not exceed the sum of five thousand dollars; and also to make and have a common seal, and the same to break, alter and renew at pleasure;
