AN ACT

To incorporate the Philadelphia Hospital.

SECT. 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That Thomas Dunlap, Jonathan K. Hassinger, Benjamin W. Richards, Henry J. Williams, Edward C. Dale, Jesse R. Burden, Thomas M. Pettit, William Fotherall, Cornelius Comegys, Morgan Carr, George F. Randolph, Samuel Chew, Robert W. Sykes, Thomas F. Betton, William E. Horner, David F. Condie, William Meredith, Joseph R. Ingersoll, H. L. Hodge, Rene La Roche, and their associates, contributors to the institution called the Philadelphia Hospital, be and they are hereby constituted a body politic and corporate, by the name, style and title of "The Philadelphia Hospital," to have perpetual succession, to sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded in all courts of record and elsewhere; to have a common seal, and the same to alter at pleasure; to take, hold and enjoy lands, tenements and hereditaments, and the same from time to time to sell, grant, devise, alien or dispose of: *Provided,* The clear yearly value of the real estate by them held, shall not exceed five thousand dollars; to make, ordain and establish such rules, by-laws and ordinances for the control of the institution and the ordering of the concerns thereof, as they may deem necessary and proper.

Contributors incorporated. Style, privileges, &c.

SECT. 2. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That the essential objects of said corporation, shall be

AN ACT

To relieve from taxation the real estate of Christ Church Hospital.

Preamble.

WHEREAS it appears that Christ Church Hospital in the city of Philadelphia, has for many years afforded an asylum to numerous poor and distressed widows, who would probably else have become a public charge; and it is represented, that in consequence of the decay of the buildings of the Hospital estate, and the increasing burthen of taxes, its means are curtailed, and its usefulness limited: Therefore,

Property and ground rents declared free from taxes.

SEC. 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the real property, including ground rents now belonging and payable to Christ Church Hospital, in the city of Philadelphia, so long as they shall continue to belong to the said Hospital, shall be, and remain free from taxes.
