AN ACT

Repealing an act, entitled "An act granting jurisdiction to the Court of Common Pleas, of Adams county, in certain cases," and the first section of an act supplementary to the act aforesaid, and for other purposes.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the act entitled "An act granting jurisdiction to the court of common pleas of Adams county in certain cases," approved the sixth day of June, eighteen hundred and thirty-nine, and the first section of the act supplementary to said act, approved the fifth day of March, Anno Domini eighteen hundred and forty-one, be and the same are hereby repealed, and that all causes transferred to the court of common pleas of Adams county, under the provisions of the first named act, if not already decided, be re-transferred to the court of common pleas of York county, without prejudice to the proceedings had in Adams county, the costs due to said county of Adams, under the provisions of the supplementary act of eighteen hundred and forty-one, above referred to, having been first paid and discharged, and the prothonotary of the court of common pleas, of Adams county shall, at the request of either of the parties, and upon payment of the costs as aforesaid, certify to the court of common pleas of York county, any record or records, entry or other proceedings had, made, or entered in Adams county, and the prothonotary of the court of common pleas of York county, shall enter the same of record, and the same proceeding may be had thereon in York county, and with like effect as if said causes had never been transferred to Adams county.

SECTION 2. That the third section of the act authorizing the Governor to incorporate the Codorus Navigation Company, passed the twelfth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and twenty-five, be so amended as that the stockholders of said company, shall elect a president and nine managers, who together with the managers representing the commonwealth, shall elect or appoint all the other officers of said company.

SECTION 3. The company shall be allowed to hold and

To hold land to erect toll houses occupy sufficient land to erect toll houses and collectors offices, and the damages for said ground shall be fixed and determined as is provided for in the eleventh section of said act.

SECTION 4. The act passed the tenth day of April, eighteen hundred and thirty-five, entitled an act to graduate lands on which money is due and unpaid to the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and the several supplements thereto, shall be so construed as to extend to all islands in this commonwealth, for which patents can now be granted by law.

SECTION 5. It shall be lawful for the stockholders for building a bridge over the river Conemaugh, at Saltsburg, in Indiana county, at their first annual election after the passage of this act, to elect but five managers for said bridge, and so much of the third section of the act incorporating said company as requires the election of nine managers is hereby repealed.

SECTION 6. The first section of the act of assembly, entitled an act supplementary to the various acts relating to tavern licenses, passed the twenty-ninth day of March, eighteen hundred and forty one, be and the same is hereby repealed, so far as relates to the counties of Bucks, Northampton, Monroe, York, Bedford, Lehigh, Pike, Bucks, Montgomery, Wayne, Luzerne, Somerset, Lebanon, Schuylkill, Columbia, Clinton, Lycoming, Westmoreland, Cambria, Clearfield and Franklin.
