

RESOLUTIONS.

Passed at the Session of 1842.

A RESOLUTION

Requesting our Senators and Members of Congress, to urge the passage of a law apportioning members of Congress among the States.

WHEREAS, the holding of an extra session of the legislature will be unavoidable, unless a law to apportion members of Congress among the several states, according to the last census be passed in time to be acted upon before the usual time of adjournment: *And whereas*, It is highly desirable that no necessity for an extra session may exist.

RESOLVED, *By the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met*, That our Senators and Members of Congress be requested to use all proper and becoming exertions to have a law apportioning the representatives in Congress, among the several states passed, so that it may not be necessary for this legislature to hold an extra session for the purpose of carrying said law into effect.

RESOLVED, By the authority aforesaid, That the governor communicate, at as early a day as possible, the foregoing preamble and resolution to our Senators and Members of Congress.
