AN ACT

Relating to the docket of James Singer, late a justice of the peace, in the county of Clearfield.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That it shall be the duty of John Hall, a justice of the peace in the township of Lawrence; in the county of Clearfield, to deliver the docket of James Singer, Esquire, late a justice of the peace in Curwensville, and township of Pike, in said county, to any acting justice of the peace in the said town of Curwensville, in the said township of Pike; and the said justice to whom the said docket may be delivered, shall have the same power and authority to close up unfinished business appearing upon the said docket, and making out transcripts, &c., as if the said James Singer, had originally deposited with him the said docket.*

AN ACT

Relative to roads in the township of Birmingham, Chester county.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the provisions of an act, entitled "A further supplement to an act, entitled 'An Act granting certain powers to the authorities of the cities of Lancaster and Philadelphia, and for other purposes,' passed April sixteenth, eighteen hundred and thirty-eight," said supplement having passed the eleventh day of March, one thousand eight hundred and*

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forty-two, be and the same is hereby extended to the township of Birmingham, in the county of Chester.

AN ACT

Better to establish part of the line between the counties of Fayette and Somerset.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That* John R. Lore, of Saltlick township, in the county of Fayette, and John Hannah, of the county of Somerset, be and are hereby appointed commissioners for the purpose of ascertaining the line between the said counties lying between the Youghiogheny river and the Westmoreland county line.

SECTION 2. The said commissioners shall employ a surveyor, and a sufficient number of chain carriers, in order to survey the same.

SECTION 3. The said commissioners shall be allowed two dollars a day for each day spent in running the said line, the surveyor two dollars per day, and the chain carriers, each, one dollar a day.

SECTION 4. The surveyor so employed, shall make two complete drafts of said line, which he shall cause to be well marked upon the ground, and one of them shall be filed in the court of quarter sessions of each of the said counties; and the said commissioners shall make out their respective accounts and present them to the commissioners of each county aforesaid, under oath, which shall embrace the number of days each person engaged, was employed, and the same shall be paid in equal parts by the respective counties, by drafts upon the treasurer in the usual way.
