A N A C T

Relative to the election of constables in the counties of Warren and Cambria, and for other purposes.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That so much of any law or laws as prevents a person from serving as constable more than three years in any term of six years, be and the same is hereby repealed, so far as respects the county of Warren.

SECTION 2. That the election of constables in the several townships in the county of Warren, previous to the passage of this act, shall not be deemed illegal, on account of all or any of said constables having served in said offices for three years or more.

SECTION 3. That from and after the passage of this act, that part of the fifth section of the act passed the twenty-eighth day of March, Anno Domini, one thousand eight hundred and twenty, entitled a further supplement to an act, entitled an act to amend and consolidate with its supplements the act, entitled 'An Act for the recovery of debts and demands, not exceeding one hundred dollars, before a justice of the peace, and for the election of constables, and for other purposes,' which prohibits a person to serve as constable or deputy constable, more than two years in any term of three years, is hereby repealed, so far as regards Conemaugh township, in the county of Cambria; and that the election of constable in the county and township aforesaid, previous to the passage of this act, shall not be deemed illegal on account of the said constable having served in said office more than two years.

SECTION 4. That so much of any law or laws as prevents a person from serving as a constable more than two years, in any term of three

Centre county. years, be and the same is hereby repealed, so far as respects the township of Potter, in the county of Centre.

Philadelphia, Passyunk town-
ship. SECTION 5. That it shall be the duty of each of the supervisors of the township of Passyunk, in the county of Philadelphia, elected in the spring of one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, and those who may hereafter be elected, to enter into a bond in double the sum of the amount of the duplicate of taxes assessed in any one year, for township purposes, with at least one approved security, conditioned for the faithful collecting the same, and accounting for all moneys received by them and paying over all balances in their hands to their successors in office; the court of common pleas in said county shall approve of said bonds, and shall have the power to allow their said accounts and compel settlements thereof, at least once in every year; the supervisors elected in eighteen hundred and forty-four shall enter into the above named bond within thirty days after the passage of this act, and all supervisors hereafter elected shall give the required security at the term of the said court, immediately succeeding their said election.

Elections, Pottsville borough. SECTION 6. That the time for holding the borough elections in the borough of Pottsville, shall be on the days now fixed by law, and the polls shall be opened between the hours of eight and ten o'clock, in the morning, and close at seven o'clock in the evening; and it shall be the duty of the judges and inspectors elected at the March elections next preceding the borough elections, to officiate as the officers of the respective wards for which they shall have been so elected at the borough elections, except that the judges and inspectors elected for the Northwest ward, as aforesaid, shall officiate as the officers of borough elections held in and for the North ward, in said borough.

AN ACT

Providing that the treasurers of Lycoming and Schuylkill counties shall receive a fixed salary, and regulating fees in certain cases, and for other purposes.

Lycoming county. SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That from and after the expiration of the term of office of the present incumbent, the treasurer of the county of Lycoming shall be entitled to, and receive in lieu of the compensation now allowed by law, a stated and fixed salary of three hundred dollars per annum, in addition to the fees and compensation now received by him for the collection and paying
