## A N A C T

For the settlement of certain accounts.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same.* That the auditor general is hereby required to settle the accounts of Edward C. Markley and Thomas B. Town, for goods furnished to William J. B. Andrews, late clerk of the house of representatives; and the present clerk of said house shall pay over to said Markley and Town, all moneys received on account of sales of said goods, and also return to them any balance of said goods not yet disposed of; and the auditor general shall allow said Markley and Town only such balance as may be found due, after deduction being made of the amount of said goods so returned at the original cost, and the amount of money paid over by said clerk, and such balance shall be paid by his warrant to the state treasurer: *Provided,* That said Edward C. Markley and Thomas B. Town shall furnish a regular account of the items verified by affidavit.

Accounts of Edward C. Markley and Thomas B. Town.

SECTION 2. That the clerks of the senate and house of representatives are hereby directed to settle and pay the accounts yet due for newspapers furnished the members and officers of the legislature, by authority of either branch thereof, for the session one thousand eight hundred and forty-three, and the same shall be allowed in the settlement of their respective accounts before the auditor general.

## A N A C T

To authorize a settlement of the claim of the Harrisburg bank, and for other purposes.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the auditor general be and he is hereby authorized and required to make a final settlement with the Harrisburg bank, of its claims, founded upon

a certain note for fifty thousand dollars, dated June thirty, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-eight, signed by certain private citizens, and discounted by said bank for the use of the Commonwealth, in the repair of the Huntingdon breach, in the Pennsylvania canal, and draw his warrant upon the state treasurer in favor of said bank for any amount which may be found due for principal and interest on said note from its maturity, until the time of the transfer by the state treasurer of fifty thousand dollars from the Girard bank to the said Harrisburg bank, for the purpose of stopping the accruing interest; and on final settlement in the manner herein stated, said note shall be surrendered to the drawers thereof: *Provided*, That the said sum of fifty thousand dollars, now on deposit in said bank, shall be applied to the payment of said note.

SECTION 2. That the state treasurer and auditor general are hereby required to examine and audit the accounts and vouchers of the several persons entrusted with the receipts and disbursements of the money necessarily expended in repairing the breach on the Juniata division of the Pennsylvania canal, between Hollidaysburg and Huntingdon; and shall audit and settle the said accounts upon the same principle, and in the same manner as the accounts for repairs and construction of the canals are settled, and according to the mode prescribed by existing laws, as if the money had been originally drawn from the treasury in the usual manner.

## AN ACT

To authorize George Schmucker and others, trustees, to sell and convey certain real estate.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same*, That George Schmucker, Charles Eicholtz and John Hile, be and they are hereby constituted trustees, with authority to sell and convey, in fee simple, the old stone church and lot of ground connected therewith, situate in Williamsburg, Huntingdon county: *Provided*, That before any such sale, the consent of two-thirds of the male members of the Lutheran church of Williamsburg, shall be obtained: *And provided further*, That nothing hereinbefore contained shall authorize the said trustees to interfere with the grave yard connected with the said old
