RESOLUTION

Relative to employing counsel in the cases of the Commonwealth *vs.* Thomas Weaver and Frederick Fritz.

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That George M. Dallas, Esquire, be and is hereby employed as counsel for the commonwealth, in the case of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania *vs.* Thomas Weaver and Frederick Fritz, in the district court of the city and county of Philadelphia, Nos. 1215 and 1216, of September term, 1839, with instructions to bring the same to a speedy termination; and also to attend to the interests of the commonwealth, if necessary, in the suit pending in the case of Thomas Weaver *vs.* Jacob Dock, for the recovery of the amount of a check drawn by Frederick Fritz, as collector, in favor of said Weaver upon said Dock; and that the attorney general be and he is hereby directed and required to deliver to the said George M. Dallas, all the papers and documents connected with said suit; and that the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars is hereby appropriated for the payment of counsel fees, after the services shall have been rendered: and that Garrick Mallery be authorized to discharge the duties imposed by this act on George M. Dallas, in case of the inability from any cause of Mr. Dallas, or his refusal.
