AN ACT

To authorize the election of township treasurers in Potter and M'Kean counties.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That it shall be lawful for the electors of the several townships in Potter and M'Kean counties, at the time of holding their township elections, annually to elect for each of their several townships, one township treasurer, who shall perform the same duties, and be subject to the same regulations, and receive the same compensation as other township treasurers in this commonwealth.

SECTION 2. So much of any act of Assembly as is inconsistent herewith, be and the same is hereby repealed.

AN ACT

To divide the district of Spring Garden into wards and precincts, and to increase the number of commissioners.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That Spring Garden the incorporated district of Spring Garden, in the county of Philadelphia, shall be divided into seven wards, in the manner following, to wit:

From the north side of Vine street to the middle of Noble street, as far west as Ninth street; from thence along the middle of James street to Eleventh street; and from the middle of Sixth street to the middle of Eleventh street, shall be the first ward.

From the middle of Noble street, as far west as Ninth street; from thence along the middle of James street to the middle of Eleventh street; and from thence to the middle of Green street; and from the

middle of Sixth street to the middle of Eleventh street, shall be the second ward.

Third ward. From the middle of Green street to the northern boundary of the district, and from the middle of Sixth street to the middle of Eleventh street, shall be the third ward. And each of said wards shall be divided into two precincts, by a line running along the middle of Ninth street; and so much of each of said wards as lies east of said Ninth street, shall be the first precincts; and so much of said wards as lies west of said Ninth street, shall be the second precincts.

Fourth ward. From the north side of Vine street to the middle of Green street, and from the middle of Eleventh street to the middle of Broad street, shall be the fourth ward.

Fifth ward. From the middle of Green street to the northern boundary of the district, and from the middle of Eleventh street to the middle of Broad street, shall be the fifth ward.

Sixth ward. From the north side of Vine street to the northern boundary of the district, and from the middle of Broad street to the middle of Schuylkill Fourth street, shall be the sixth ward.

Seventh ward. From the north side of Vine street to the northern boundary of the district, and from the middle of Schuylkill Fourth street to the Schuylkill river, shall be the seventh ward.

Elections where held. SECTION 2. That all general and special elections in said district shall hereafter be held at the following places, to wit:

In first ward. The qualified electors residing in the first precinct of the first ward, shall vote at the public house now occupied by Michael Arnold, on the north side of Callowhill street, between Marshall and Seventh streets.

In first ward. The qualified electors residing in the second precinct of the first ward, shall vote at the public house now occupied by Joseph Stelwagon, on the south-westerly side of Ridge road, between Vine and Wood streets.

In second ward. The qualified electors residing in the first precinct of the second ward, shall vote at the public house now occupied by Charles Hause, at the south-west corner of Eighth and Spring Garden streets.

In second ward. The qualified electors residing in the second precinct of the second ward, shall vote at the public house now occupied by John Boger, at the north-west corner of Charles and James streets.

In third ward. The qualified electors residing in the first precinct of the third ward, shall vote at the public house now occupied by Mrs. Davis, at the south-east corner of Seventh and Coates streets.

In third ward. The qualified electors residing in the second precinct of the third ward, shall vote at the public house now occupied by Peter Buddy, at the north-west corner of Green and Ninth streets.

In fourth ward. The qualified electors residing in the fourth ward, shall vote at the public house now occupied by Jacob Kennerd, on the north side of Callowhill street, between Twelfth and Thirteenth streets.

In fifth ward. The qualified electors residing in the fifth ward, shall vote at the public house now occupied by William T. Miller, at the north-east corner of Broad and Coates streets.

In sixth ward. The qualified electors residing in the sixth ward, shall vote at the public house now occupied by Henry Young, at the south-east corner of Schuylkill Eighth and Callowhill streets.

In seventh ward. The qualified electors residing in the seventh ward, shall vote at the public house now occupied by Rudolph H. Bartle, at the south-east corner of Pennsylvania avenue and Coates streets: *Provided*, That it

Proviso. May change places of holding elections. shall and may be lawful for the qualified voters of each of said wards and precincts, to change the place of holding the said elections of their wards and precincts, to such other places in the same wards and pre-

incts as may be most convenient for them, in the same manner and under the same regulations, as is by law provided for changing the place of holding ward elections in the city of Philadelphia.

SECTION 3. That the aldermen now in commission in the district wards, for the time for which they were elected, be the aldermen of the wards in which they reside.

And the qualified electors of the third, fifth and seventh wards, shall elect an alderman for each of said wards, on the third Friday of March next; and the qualified electors of each of the wards shall, on the third Friday of March next, and annually thereafter, elect one constable, one assessor and two assistant assessors, at the time prescribed by law for electing the same.

3d 5th and 7th wards to elect aldermen and other officers.

And the qualified electors of each of the precincts of the first, second and third wards, shall elect for each precinct one judge and two inspectors of elections; and the qualified voters of the fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh wards, shall elect for each of said wards one judge and two inspectors of elections.

Election officers of 1st 2nd and 3d ward to be elected

SECTION 4. That the officers conducting the election on the third Friday in March next, at the two new election polls created by this act, to wit: in the second ward at the house of Charles Hause, south-west corner of Eighth and Spring Garden streets, and at the house of John Boger, at the north-west corner of James and Charles streets, shall be appointed as follows: The judge of the first precinct, first ward, shall appoint a judge of the election in the first precinct, second ward; and each of the inspectors of the first precinct, first ward, shall appoint an inspector for the first precinct of the second ward; and in the same mode, the judges and inspectors of the second precinct of the first ward, shall appoint a judge and inspectors for the second precinct of the second ward, to conduct the election on the third Friday of March next. The officers elected to conduct the elections in the first precinct, third ward, shall act as election officers of the sixth ward; and the officers elected to conduct the election in the second precinct of the third ward, shall act as election officers of the seventh ward. All the other polls, the judges and inspectors elected to conduct the elections at said polls, shall act as election officers for the time for which they were elected.

Election officers to be appointed for new districts.

SECTION 5. It shall be the duty of the commissioners of the county of Philadelphia, to furnish to the additional judges and inspectors to be appointed under this act, ballot boxes, blank forms and lists of taxables, as are now by law furnished to judges and inspectors of elections within the said district, and to pay the said additional judges, inspectors and clerks, the same compensation as to other election officers.

Duties of county commissioners.

SECTION 6. That the qualified electors of the district of Spring Garden shall, at the general election on the second Tuesday of October next, elect eleven persons to serve as commissioners of said district, seven of whom to serve for three years, two for two years, and two for one year; and annually thereafter they shall elect seven persons to serve as commissioners for three years, so that the board of commissioners of said district shall hereafter consist of twenty-one members.

Spring Garden to elect eleven commissioners.
