Relating to Big Equinunk creek, in the county of Wayne.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That from and after the passage of this act, the Big Equinunk creek, in the county of Wayne, from Alexander Lauthin's mill to the mouth of said creek, where it empties into the Delaware river, be and is hereby declared a public highway, for the passing of logs, lumber and rafts; and it shall be lawful for the inhabitants and others desirous of using the navigation of said creek, to remove all natural or artificial obstructions from the same: *Provided,* That no mill dam erected, or hereafter to be erected, shall be disturbed or injured, if the owner or occupier of said dam shall, during high water, leave free and unobstructed twenty-five feet of the surface of said stream and upper ridge of the dam, for the free and easy floating of such logs, lumber and rafts through and over such mill dam or dams. Big Equinunk creek declared a public highway.

A N A C T

To apportion the district of Kensington, and to regulate the board of commissioners.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the incorporated district of Kensington, in the county of Philadelphia, shall be and hereby is divided into seven wards, in the manner following, to wit:

All that portion of the said district bounded as follows, shall constitute one ward, to be called the First ward, commencing on the river Delaware, at the boundary line between the incorporated districts of Kensington and the Northern Liberties; thence northward along the First ward.
