AN ACT

To change the name and grade of certain volunteer companies.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That from and after the passage of this act, the rifle company in the county of Greene, called the "Cumberland Rangers," shall be and they are hereby changed into an infantry company, to be called the "Cumberland Blues;" and that the seven years service of each individual member thereof, shall be calculated from the date of the organization of said company as a rifle corps; and the adjutant general is hereby authorized, upon the requisition of the proper brigade inspector, to furnish said company with the proper number of muskets and accoutrements, under such restrictions and securities as are provided by existing laws: *Provided,* That before any arms are delivered to said company, the rifles and accoutrements that may now be in their possession, shall be delivered in good order, to the proper brigade inspector: *And provided further,* That said company shall equip themselves, in conformity to the dress of infantry of the army of the United States.

SECTION 2. That from and after the passage of this act, the military company in the county of Allegheny, called the "Cherokee Tribe," shall be and the same is hereby changed into an infantry corps, to be called the "St. Clair Guards;" and that all acts done under the former name of the "Cherokee Tribe" shall not be affected in any manner by this act; and that the said corps shall enjoy all the advantages, in point of date or age of company officers, as if this act had not been passed.

Cherokee Tribe changed to St. Clair Guards.

SECTION 3. That from and after the passage of this act, the military company in the county of Carbon, called the "Citizen Blues," shall be and is hereby changed to the "Stockton Artillerists;" and that all acts done under the former name, of the "Citizen Blues," shall not be affected in any manner by this act; and that the said corps shall enjoy all the advantages, in point of date, or age of company officers, as if this act had not been passed.

Citizen Blues, changed to Stockton Artillerists.

SECTION 4. That from and after the passage of this act, the rifle company of the "Perry Guards" shall be and it is hereby changed into an infantry corps, to be called the "Perry Guards;" and that the seven years service of each individual member thereof, shall be calculated from the respective date of his enrollment as a member; and it shall be the duty of the adjutant general, to furnish, upon the order of the proper brigade inspector, out of any of the arsenals of this commonwealth, when a sufficient number of unappropriated arms may be had, the usual stand of muskets for the use of the said company, under the restrictions, provisions and securities as are now provided by law; and the officers which were elected by the said company at their last election, are hereby

AN ACT

To authorize John Hill to construct a dam in the Kiskiminetas river.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That John Hill, of the county of Armstrong, be and is hereby authorized to erect a dam, not exceeding five feet in height, over the Kiskiminetas river, at or near his mill, about three miles above the mouth of said river, in such manner as shall do no damage to either public or private property: *Provided however,* That a plan and location of said dam shall be first approved by the canal commissioners, and shall be erected within seven years after the passage of this act.

SECTION 2. That Henry Etter, of Newberry township, in the county of York, his heirs and assigns, be and they are hereby authorized and empowered, to construct and erect such dam or dams, as he or they may deem advisable, from Hill island to the York county shore, abutting the same upon his or their own land, with the exclusive right to the said Etter, his heirs and assigns, of drawing off the water of the Susquehanna river at that place, and of constructing races, sluices, canals, waste wiers, &c., for milling purposes, or otherwise, as he or they may deem necessary, and of using, leasing, or selling the right to use the same: *Provided,* That the said Etter, his heirs or assigns, shall not in any wise impede or obstruct the navigation of the main channel of said river: *And provided also,* That he or they pay all damages to private property, caused by the erection or construction and maintenance of said dams, and all races, sluices, water ways or waste wiers useful to, or appertaining to the said water powers thereby created: *Provided further,* That the said Etter, his heirs or assigns, may sell, lease, mortgage or pledge the said improvements or privileges, or any part thereof, for the construction, improvement or benefit of the same, or otherwise.
