A SUPPLEMENT

To "An Act for the relief of the Cumberland Valley railroad company," passed fourteenth April, one thousand eight hundred and forty-five.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That* the Cumberland Valley railroad company shall have power, and they are hereby authorized to borrow a sum of money, not exceeding thirty thousand dollars, to be applied towards defraying the expense of rebuilding their bridge across the Susquehanna river, at Harrisburg, and to pledge the income, profits and property of the said company, or any part thereof, *by mortgages or otherwise, to secure the repayment of such sum or sums as shall be borrowed in pursuance of the provisions of this act.*

Authority to borrow money.

Powers granted to loan holders.

Proviso.

SECTION 2. That any person or persons, his, her or their heirs, executors, administrators or assigns, who shall loan to the said company, any sum or sums of money, for the purpose of enabling them to rebuild the said bridge, shall be entitled to all the privileges of stockholders of the said company, to the whole amount of the debt of the said company, of which they shall be holders, so far as to entitle him, her or them, to vote at all elections or meetings of stockholders of the said company; and the number of votes to which each of the said stockholders shall be entitled, shall be regulated as the same is now provided as to the original stockholders; estimating fifty dollars of the said loan, as equivalent to one share: *Provided, That no assignee of the said loan, shall be entitled to vote whose assignment has not been made and noted upon the books of the company, at least three months previously to the election or meeting at which he proposes to vote.*
