AN ACT

For the relief of George Robinson.

WHEREAS, It is represented that in the month of November, one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, George Robinson, inspector of the third brigade, eleventh division, Pennsylvania militia, by the accidental burning of his house, had consumed certain vouchers and money, viz: the sum of sixty-three dollars in relief notes in his hands for the payment of militia expenses, and receipts to the amount of nine dollars, for payments made on account of the same; therefore,

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the auditor general be authorized and required to enter a credit to the account of George Robinson, inspector as aforesaid, for the sum of seventy-two dollars: *Provided,* That the said George Robinson shall present such testimony to the auditor general, as shall satisfy him of the truth of the allegation set forth in the preamble to this act.

AN ACT

Relating to Mahanoy creek.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That so much of an act, entitled “An act declaring the river Susquehanna and other streams therein mentioned, public highways, for improving the navigation of said river and streams, and preserving the fish in the same,” passed the ninth day of March, one thousand seven hundred and seventy-one, as declares Mahanoy creek, in the county of North-

umberland, a public highway, and the other provisions of said act relating thereto, be and are hereby repealed.

AN ACT

Relating to non-accepting school districts, in the county of Lancaster, and for other purposes.

Preamble.

WHEREAS, A difference of opinion exists among school directors, of non-accepting school districts, in regard to that part of the law of eighteen hundred and nine, which provides books and stationery for poor children gratis :

And whereas, The directors of some of the non-accepting districts have refused, and persist in refusing to pay for the books and stationery of poor children ; therefore,

School directors to allow books and stationery.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That so much of the act, entitled “An Act to provide for the education of the poor in the non-accepting school districts of this commonwealth, and for other purposes,” approved July thirtieth, eighteen hundred and forty-two, as conflicts with that part of the law of eighteen hundred and nine, which allows books and stationery to poor children, gratis, be and the same is hereby repealed, so far as relates to Lancaster county ; and that teachers be allowed the same compensation for instructing poor children in reading, writing and arithmetic, as is allowed them for teaching said branches to all others in the respective common schools of said county in which the poor are taught gratis.

Compensation of teachers.

Schools in Montgomery township, Franklin county, regulated.

SECTION 2. That the twelfth, thirteenth, fourteenth and fifteenth sections of the act, entitled “An Act to authorize the Governor to incorporate a company for the purpose of erecting a permanent bridge over the river Conemaugh, at or near Lockport, in Westmoreland county, and for laying out a State road from Blairsville, in Indiana county, to Mount Pleasant, in Westmoreland county, and for other purposes,” passed the twenty-ninth day of March, eighteen hundred and forty-two,
