A FURTHER SUPPLEMENT

To the penal laws of this commonwealth.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That if any person or persons, engaged in transporting coal, iron, lumber, or other articles of merchandize, or any property whatsoever, on any river, railroad or canal within this commonwealth, shall sell, dispose of, or pledge the same, or any part thereof, without the consent of the owner or owners thereof, such offence shall be deemed a misdemeanor; and on conviction therefor, shall be punished by fine, not less than fifty, nor exceeding five hundred dollars; shall suffer imprisonment in the county jail in which the offence is committed, for a term of not less than twenty days, nor more than one year, at the discretion of the court.

Penalty for selling property entrusted for transportation.

SECTION 2. If any person or persons, after the first day of July, Anno Domini, one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, shall purchase any coal, iron, or other articles of merchandize, or any property whatever, consigned to any person in this state, or in any adjoining state, knowing the same to be consigned from any captain of a canal boat, or any other person engaged in transporting the said property, without the consent of the owners of said property, he, she or they so purchasing, shall be liable to pay such owners double the value of the property so purchased, to be recovered with costs of suits, by action of trover or trespass, in the case; and the said action may be brought in the name of the consigner or consignee; and no prosecution by indictments against the person or persons having sold such property shall be any bar to such action.

Penalty for purchasing such property.

Penalty in second section act March 24, 1846, increased relative to Monongahela navigation co.

SECTION 3. The penalty imposed by the second section of the act, entitled "A further supplement to the act, entitled, 'An Act to authorize the governor to incorporate a company to construct a slack-water navigation in the Monongahela river,' approved the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and forty-six," shall be fifty dollars;

and the same shall be recoverable in like manner, as if the penalty had been made fifty dollars, in the said second section of the said act.

AN ACT

Regulating the appointment of road viewers in the county of Perry, and for other purposes.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That hereafter, the number of road viewers appointed by the court of quarter sessions of the county of Perry, shall be three; and every view and review shall be made by the whole number of viewers so appointed, a majority of whom shall concur in their report, in order to its confirmation by said court. Number of road viewers to be appointed.

SECTION 2. The viewers so appointed shall have power to decide upon, and fix the width of the road viewed or reviewed by them, and shall report the same to the aforesaid court. Power of viewers.

SECTION 3. That where a public road, in Toboyne township, Perry county, passes over a mountain or hill, or along side the same, which requires heavy cutting or excavation to level or grade the same, the supervisors shall not be required to open the same, at such places, more than twelve feet, with the proper number of passing places the usual width. Width of road in Toboyne township.

SECTION 4. The supervisors aforesaid, shall not be required to open and keep in repair, a road leading from Waterford to Concord, through the aforesaid township, to a greater width than twenty feet, except at passing places. Width of Waterford and Concord road.
