AN ACT

To incorporate the Odd Fellows' hall association.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That* Howell Hopkins, Napoleon B. Leidy, William Robertson, John G. Thomson, John L. Stiles, Edwin M. Mather, Thomas Sinclair, William B. Edwards, William M. Allen, James S. Farner, John Baird, Thomas Graham, Henry A. Bergman, George Maharge, James Lowry, William Allen, Cornelius Conly and Benjamin N. Lewis, and their successors, and all persons who now are, or hereafter may be associated with them, be and they are hereby created and erected into a body politic and corporate, in deed and in law, by the name, style and title of the "Odd Fellows' hall association, of the city and county of Philadelphia," and by that name, shall have perpetual succession, and be able to sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded, in any court of law or equity, and elsewhere; and shall be able and capable, in law and equity, to take and hold to them and their successors, either by grant, gift, devise or lease, any lands or real estate, for the purpose of erecting thereon a suitable building or buildings, for the use of said association; and also, to take and hold, for the use of the said association, any goods and chattels, sum or sums of money, by gift, grant, bargain, sale, will, devise or bequest, from any person or persons whatsoever, capable of making the same; and the same, at their pleasure, to grant, bargain, and sell, for the use of said association; and generally, to do all and singular the matters and things which shall be lawful for them to do, for the well being and due management of the affairs of said association: *Provided*, That the real estate of which the said corporation shall be at any time possessed, shall not exceed the clear yearly value of five thousand dollars. Incorporators. Privileges. Proviso.

SECTION 2. The object of the said corporation shall be, to provide, erect and furnish a hall, or suitable building or buildings, in the city and county of Philadelphia, for the accommodation of the various lodges of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, established or to be established there; and suitable, also, for a library. Object.

Seal. SECTION 3. That it shall and may be lawful for the said corporation to have a common seal, and the same, at will and pleasure to change, alter and renew, as they shall think proper; and shall have and exercise all the rights, privileges and immunities necessary for the purposes of the corporation hereby constituted, and as herein expressed.

Government. SECTION 4. The government of the said Odd Fellows' hall association, and the management and disposition of its affairs and property, shall be vested in a board of trustees, who shall be elected annually, at such time and in such manner, as the said association shall, by its by-laws, provide; at the first meeting of the trustees, after their election, in each year, they shall elect from their body, a president, secretary and treasurer.

Proviso. SECTION 5. The corporation shall have power and authority to make by-laws conformable to this charter, and not in violation of the laws of the United States, or of this commonwealth.

Reservation. SECTION 6. That the legislature hereby reserves the right to alter, revoke or annul the charter of the said Odd Fellows' hall association, of the city and county of Philadelphia, whenever, in their opinion, it may be injurious to the citizens of this commonwealth; in such manner, however, that no injustice shall be done to the corporators thereof.

A SUPPLEMENT

To the act erecting Blair county.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the eighth and twenty-third sections of said act are hereby so altered and amended, that the first court of said county of Blair, shall be held on the fourth Monday of July next, and the October courts of said county, shall be held on the third Monday of October, in each year; and in all the other sections of said act, wherein the words "fourth Monday of July" are contained, the same are hereby altered and amended, so as to read, and be in each of said sections the "second Monday of June;" and the governor shall, on or before said second Monday of June next, appoint three judicious persons as commissioners of said county, to serve until their successors shall be duly elected and qualified, who shall perform the usual duties of county commissioners, together with such duties in relation to jurors, and a place for
