AN ACT

To authorize the state treasurer to allow Joseph Plankinton, late treasurer of the county of Philadelphia, certain credit in his account with the commonwealth.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the state treasurer be and he is hereby authorized and required to credit the account of Joseph Plankinton, late treasurer of the county of Philadelphia, with the sum of seven hundred and thirty-three dollars, consisting of notes purporting to have been issued by the Towanda Bank, under the act of the fourth day of May, Anno Domini one thousand eight hundred and forty-one, which said notes were received by him as treasurer aforesaid, on account of state taxes, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-one: *Provided,* That the state treasurer shall be satisfied, by affidavit, that the said notes were bona fide received in payment of taxes as aforesaid, without a knowledge of their illegality. Proviso.

AN ACT

For the sale of unseated lots in the borough of Bridgewater, Beaver county.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That from and after the first day of April, Anno Domini one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven, it shall be the duty of the burgess and town council of the borough of Bridgewater, in the county of Beaver, to make out and deliver annually to the county treasurer, a list of all the unseated in-lots within the limits of the said borough, with the name of the reputed owner, and the amount of the borough taxes due thereon; Town council of the borough of Beaver, to make return of unseated lots to county treasurer.

Duty of treasurer. and that it shall be the duty of the said county treasurer to advertise and sell the said lots at the same time, and in the same manner he advertises and sells unseated lands for the payment of taxes for county purposes, all lots on which taxes have been due and unpaid for more than one year; and that he, the said county treasurer, shall pay over to the burgess and town council, or their treasurer, the proceeds of such sale, deducting therefrom five per cent. for his trouble; and he is hereby made liable, on his official bond, for the faithful discharge of his official duties to the borough authorities aforesaid: *Provided*, That the said sales shall, in all respects, be governed as to the right of redemption by the original owner, by the existing laws, for the sale of unseated lands for the payment of taxes within this commonwealth.

A SUPPLEMENT

To an act, entitled "An Act to reduce the expenses of Northampton county," approved January twenty-sixth, one thousand eight hundred and forty-six.

Compensation of
county commis-
sioners.

Proviso.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That from and after the passage of this act, the compensation of each of the commissioners of the county of Northampton, shall be one dollar and fifty cents for each day spent in the performance of official duty: *Provided*, That the salary of no one commissioner shall in any case exceed the sum one hundred and fifty dollars per annum; and the proviso of the act to which this is a supplement, is hereby repealed.
