AN ACT

Regulating election districts.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the qualified voters of East Providence township, in the county of Bedford, shall hereafter hold their township and general elections at the house of John Nycum, in said township.

SECTION 2. That the qualified voters of the township of Union, in the county of Bedford, shall hereafter hold their general and township elections at the house of Philip Ickes, junior, in the said township.

SECTION 3. That the qualified voters of the township of Boggs, in the county of Clearfield, shall hereafter hold their general and township elections at the house of George Turner, in the said township.

SECTION 4. That the qualified voters of the township of Upper Dublin, in the county of Montgomery, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the public house now occupied by Benjamin Foster, in said township.

SECTION 5. That the qualified voters of the township of Liberty, in the county of Centre, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the school house at Eagleville, in said township.

SECTION 6. That the following described boundaries in the township of Allegheny, in the county of Armstrong, shall form a separate election district: beginning at the Kiskiminetas river; thence along the township line between Allegheny and Kiskiminetas townships, to the place where it crosses the road from Still's mill to Joseph Shoemaker's farm; thence a straight line to Walkin's ferry on the Allegheny river; thence down said river to the mouth of the Kiskiminetas river; thence up said river to the place of beginning; and that the qualified voters therein shall hereafter hold their general elections at the public school house in the town of Leechburg; that Anthony O'Brian act as judge, and John Ulam and John Parke, act as inspectors, to hold the first election after the passage of this act, in conformity with existing laws in this commonwealth now regulating elections.

Military elections, second brigade, first division. SECTION 7. That at all elections hereafter held for military purposes within the bounds of the second brigade, first division, Pennsylvania militia, except the election for major-general, the polls shall be kept open until nine o'clock, P. M.

Bedford. SECTION 8. That the qualified electors of the township of St. Clair, in the county of Bedford, shall hereafter hold their general and township elections at the house of Gideon D. Trout, in said township.

Berks. SECTION 9. That the qualified electors of the township of Exeter, and county of Berks, shall hereafter hold their general and township elections at the public house of Francis Ritter, in said township.

Huntingdon. SECTION 10. That hereafter the qualified voters of the township of Tell, in the county of Huntingdon, shall hold their township and general elections at the Union school house, near the Union meeting house, in said township.

Huntingdon. SECTION 11. That the qualified electors of the township of Hope-well, in the county of Huntingdon, shall hold their township and general elections at the house now occupied by Henry Zimmerman, near Entricken's new mill, in said township; and that Thomas Engart is hereby appointed judge, and Henry Zimmerman and John B. Weaver are appointed inspectors, to hold the election on the third Friday of March, Anno Domini, eighteen hundred and forty-seven, who in conducting said elections, shall be governed by the election laws of this commonwealth.

Jefferson. SECTION 12. That the qualified electors of the township of Heath, in the county of Jefferson, shall hereafter hold their general and township elections at the house of Brooks and Morris, in said township; and that Abraham Windsor shall act as judge, and John Winkook and Henry Raught as inspectors of elections in said township, until their successors shall be duly elected or appointed by law.

Susquehanna. SECTION 13. That the qualified electors of the township of Chocunut, in the county of Susquehanna, shall hereafter hold their township and general elections at the house of Justus Brown, in said township.

Tioga. SECTION 14. That the qualified voters of Delmar township, in the county of Tioga, shall hereafter hold their general and township elections at the house of Isaac F. Field, in said township; and that the annual meeting of the township auditors for said township, shall hereafter be held on the fourth Monday of February in each and every year.

Bradford. SECTION 15. That the qualified electors of the borough of Troy, in the county of Bradford, shall hold the general, special and borough elections hereafter at the Eagle tavern, kept by Franklin Herrick, in said borough.

Compensation of election officers in Bradford county, regulated. SECTION 16: That so much of the eleventh section of the act passed the twenty-first day of April, Anno Domini, eighteen hundred and forty-six, entitled "An Act regulating election districts," as reduces the compensation to be paid to the judges, inspectors and clerks of general, special and township elections in the county of Bradford, to seventy-five cents for each day's service, be and the same is hereby repealed.

Columbia. SECTION 17. That the qualified voters of the township of Maine, in the county of Columbia, shall hereafter hold their general and township elections at the house now occupied by Daniel Yetter, in said township.

Mifflin. SECTION 18. That the qualified electors of the township of Armagh, in the county of Mifflin, shall hereafter hold their township and general elections at the house now occupied by Jesse Winket, in said township.

SECTION 19. That the qualified voters of Brown township, in the county of Mifflin, shall hereafter hold their general and township elections at the house of Adam Greer, at Brown's mills, in said county. Mifflin.

SECTION 20. That the inhabitants of the borough of Armagh, in the county of Indiana, shall be and hereafter is erected into a separate district for assessment of and collection of taxes, and other purposes; and the qualified voters of said borough shall hereafter hold their elections in the school house in the borough of Armagh; and that John Thompson, junior, is hereby appointed judge, and Alexander Elliott and J. M. M'Crea, are hereby appointed inspectors for holding the election on the second Tuesday of October next, to hold an election in conformity with the existing laws of this commonwealth. Indiana.

SECTION 21. That hereafter the qualified voters of the township of Milford, in the county of Juniata, shall hold their township and general elections at Locust Grove school house, in said township. Juniata.

SECTION 22. That the limits contained within the following boundaries be erected into a township, to be called Mississinawa, to wit: beginning at the mouth of Myers's run, on the Big Sewickley creek; thence embracing the farms of Adam Vandyke, Henry Dougal, Robert M'Guffey, John J. Robertson, Adam Pose, formerly J. Robertson, jr., Robert Boyd, Thomas Hannah, Paul Warden, Henry Shupes, Wible farm, George Hough's property, Thomas Williams, Thompson lot, Charles Hewitt's property, Boy and Wallace's, M'Key property, Smith's part of the Bennet farm, and Samuel Smith's property, on the Youghiogheny river; thence down said river to the Westnewton borough line; thence round said line to the river; and thence down said river to the mouth of the Big Sewickley creek; and thence up the same to the place of beginning; and the qualified voters therein shall hereafter hold their general and township elections at the house of William Miller, in said township; that at the election to be held on the third Friday of March, eighteen hundred and forty-seven, William Plumer act as judge, and William Ross and John Frick act as inspectors thereof, who shall be governed by the laws now in force regulating elections in this commonwealth. SECTION 23. That the qualified voters of the borough of Morrisville, in the county of Bucks, shall hereafter hold their general and township elections at the school house, in said borough. Bucks.

SECTION 24. That the qualified voters of the township of Scott, in the county of Wayne, shall hereafter hold their general and township elections at the house now occupied by David Spoor, in said township. Wayne.

SECTION 25. That the qualified voters in the township of Union, in the county of Huntingdon, shall hereafter hold their general and township elections at the public school house on the farm of Ezekiel Corbin, in said township. Huntingdon.

SECTION 26. That the qualified voters of the township of White Marsh, in the county of Montgomery, shall hereafter hold their general elections at the public house of Samuel Kulp, at Barren hill, in said township. Montgomery.

SECTION 27. That the qualified voters of the township of Cascade, in the county of Lycoming, shall hereafter hold their township and general elections at the house of Jacob Harman, in said township. Lycoming.

SECTION 28. That the township line between Red Bank and Pine townships, in Armstrong county, be changed in the following manner, viz: commencing at the township line of Mahoning creek, and running south-east along the dividing line of Alexander White and J. A. Colwell and company to the foot of the Hog Back hill road; and all persons living in the bounds of the territory thus added are to be considered Armstrong.

Washington. SECTION 29. That from and after the passage of this act, the township of East Pike Run, in the county of Washington, to be separated from the borough of Greenfield, in said township, for election purposes; and that hereafter the citizens of said township shall hold their township and general elections at the house of Noah Scott, in said township; and Simeon Jackman is hereby appointed judge, and James Ailes and Morrison Chester are hereby appointed inspectors, to hold the general election on the second Tuesday of October, in accordance with existing laws of the commonwealth.

Northumberland. SECTION 30. That the qualified voters of Upper Augusta township, in Northumberland county, shall hereafter hold their spring elections on the third Friday in March, at the farm house of Henry Yoxthimer, now occupied by Daniel Snyder; and that Henry Yoxthimer act as judge, and Elijah Cline and James Forester act as inspectors of said election.

Indiana, Hugh Knox attached to North Mahoning township. SECTION 31. That Hugh Knox, now a resident of Montgomery township, Indiana county, be and is hereby entitled to all the rights of a citizen of North Mahoning township, in said county; and that part or parcel of land now belonging to the said Knox, in Montgomery township, be recognized as belonging to North Mahoning township.

Westmoreland, citizens of Sewickly to decide by ballot on the increase of school tax. SECTION 32. That the qualified voters of Sewickley township, in Westmoreland county, shall, at the time of electing their school directors, vote for or against an additional tax of one dollar on each taxable in said township; tickets labelled on the outside school, inside tax or no tax; if a majority of the votes polled are in favor of tax, then the school directors shall be authorized to levy and collect an additional tax of one dollar on each taxable inhabitant in said township, for school purposes.

Union. SECTION 33. That the votable citizens of Penn township, in Union county, shall hereafter hold their general and township elections in the Union school house, in the town of Selinsgrove; and all laws inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

Fayette. SECTION 34. That the qualified voters of the township of Tyrone, in the county of Fayette, shall hereafter hold their general and township elections at the Washington school house, in said township.

Philadelphia co., Richmond district. Election officers appointed. Duty of county commissioners. SECTION 35. That John O'Brien is hereby appointed judge, and Philip Duffy and Henry Funk are hereby appointed inspectors, for holding the election for judge, inspectors and other district officers, to be held at the house of Elisha M'Carty, in the district of Richmond, in the county of Philadelphia, on the third Friday in March, eighteen hundred and forty-seven, and each of the inspectors hereby appointed shall appoint one clerk; it shall be the duty of the commissioners of the county of Philadelphia, to furnish to the additional judge and inspectors to be appointed under this section, ballot boxes, blanks, forms, and so forth, the same as are now furnished to judges and inspectors in other districts in said county, and to pay the said judge, inspectors and clerks, the same compensation as to other election officers: *Provided*, That the judge and inspectors elected to conduct the elections in the township of the unincorporated Northern Liberties, shall serve as election officers in said township for the term for which they were elected.

Proviso. Northern Liberties, unincorporated. SECTION 36. That the qualified voters of the township of Fawn, in the county of York, shall hereafter hold their township and general election at the house of George Coates, in said township.

That the third section of the act, entitled "An Act to attach part of Blair township, in Blair county, to the Hollidaysburg borough common school district, and for other purposes," approved the third day of April, one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, be and the same is hereby repealed. SECTION 38. That the qualified voters of the township of Broad Top, in the county of Bedford, shall hereafter hold their general and township elections at Gibson's school house, in said county. Bedford.

SECTION 39. That the qualified voters of Penn Forest township, in Carbon county, shall hereafter hold their township and general elections at the Hickory Run school house, in said township. Carbon.

SECTION 40. That the qualified electors residing within the limits of that portion of Asylum township, Bradford county, recently set off by authority of the court of quarter sessions in and for said county to the township of Durell, shall vote at the general and township elections at the place for holding elections in said Durell township. Bradford.

SECTION 41. That the qualified electors of the township of Licking creek, in the county of Bedford, shall hereafter hold their township and general elections at school house number three, in said township. Bedford.

SECTION 42. That from and after the passage of this act, the borough of Pottstown, in the county of Montgomery, shall be and is hereby divided into two wards, in the manner following, to wit: all that part of said borough lying east of a line running from the Schuylkill along the middle of Hanover street to Beach street, shall constitute one ward, to be called East ward; and all that part of said borough lying west of the line aforesaid, shall constitute another ward, to be called West ward. SECTION 43. That at each and every yearly election for school directors in the township of Elizabeth, county of Allegheny, the voters thereof shall have power to vote tickets thus: on the outside labelled "schools," and on the inside either "tax" or "no tax," and if it be found on counting said tickets that a majority of said votes have voted "tax," then the school directors of said township shall proceed to assess, and cause to be collected, an additional tax of one dollar on each taxable inhabitant of said township, which shall be used for common school purposes; and if a majority of said tickets be "no tax," then the directors aforesaid shall have power to assess and collect only such taxes as are now by law allowed. SECTION 44. That the fourth section of an act, approved twenty-first April, eighteen hundred and forty-six, entitled "An Act taxing dogs in certain counties, and for other purposes," be and the same is hereby repealed. Additional school

SECTION 45. That hereafter the south half of the township of Clara, in the county of Potter, shall form a separate election district, and the election shall be held at the school house near the dwelling of S. A. Fish, in said township. Potter.

SECTION 46. That hereafter the qualified voters of the township of Rush, in the county of Northumberland, shall hold their general and township elections at the Liberty Pole school house, in said township. Northumberland.

SECTION 47. That hereafter the qualified voters of the township of Muncy creek, in the county of Lycoming, shall hold their township and general elections at the store of Joseph Gudykunst and company, at Muncy mills, in said township.

SECTION 48. That hereafter the qualified voters of the township of Porter, in the county of Jefferson, shall hold their township and general elections at the house of R. M. M'Farland, in said township. Jefferson.

SECTION 49. That the qualified voters of the borough of West Greenville, in the county of Mercer, shall hereafter hold their general and Mercer.

borough elections at the public house of Thomas A. Packard, in said borough.

SECTION 50. That the qualified voters of the township of North Mahoning, in the county of Indiana, shall hereafter hold their general and township elections at the house of Nicholas Moul, in said township.

SECTION 51. That hereafter the qualified voters of Londonderry, in the county of Dauphin, shall hold their general and township elections at the public house of Henry Fisher, in said township.

SECTION 52. That hereafter the qualified voters of that portion of Indiana township, in the county of Allegheny, residing in the following described boundary, shall vote at all general elections in the borough of Sharpsburg, at the election poll of said borough, viz: beginning at a point on the Allegheny river at the upper line of the farm of James Ross, and running a northerly course between the farms of the said Ross and John and Francis Beatty to the north-east corner of said Ross' farm; thence running a westerly course to the Ross township line, in such manner as to embrace all such farms or lots situated in Cunningham's district, and known and belonging to what are called the River tracts, in the above described boundary.

SECTION 53. That the qualified voters of the district of Richmond, in the county of Philadelphia, shall, on the third Friday of March, eighteen hundred and forty-seven, elect one alderman, who shall be a resident of said district.

SECTION 54. That the qualified voters of the township of Heidelberg, in the county of York, shall hold their township and general election in the borough of Hanover, at the house where the borough election is held.

SECTION 55. That from and after the passage of this act, the qualified voters of those parts of the several townships of East Donegal and Rapho respectively, in the county of Lancaster, included within the bounds of the twenty-second election district of said county, shall vote for township officers at the Bell school house, in the village of Mount Joy, and at the same place shall, annually, elect one judge and two inspectors for each of said parts of said townships; and the several remaining parts of said townships shall hold their township elections as heretofore; and the judges of said elections held in the Bell school house, as aforesaid, for said several parts of East Donegal and Rapho shall, the Monday after such election, meet the judges of said township elections respectively, who preside in Marietta and Maytown and Sporting Hill: that is, the judges for the township election for East Donegal shall meet at the house of Jacob Gilman, in the village of Maytown; and the judges for the township election for Rapho shall meet at the time aforesaid, at the public house of Jacob Summy, in Sporting Hill; and the judges so met respectively, shall cast up the votes given for the several proper township officers hereby elected conjointly, according to law, and make a return of the same, as now required by the laws regulating such elections: *Provided*, That the judges and inspectors of the last general election in the twenty-second election district, shall hold such township elections, in the Bell school house, on the third Friday of March, eighteen hundred and forty-seven.

SECTION 56. And the fourth section of the act, entitled "An Act authorizing the citizens of Robeson and Hay Creek townships, in Berks county, to vote for or against the new township of Hay Creek, and for other purposes," approved the twenty-first day February, one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, is hereby repealed.

SECTION 57. That an act relating to roads and bridges in Butler county, passed February, eighteen hundred and forty-seven, authorizing the citizens of said county to decide, by ballot, for or against the present road law, be and the same is hereby extended to Mercer county, except the third section where it reads "the two highest in votes shall act as supervisors," which shall read "the three highest, &c.;" and the same shall go into operation on the third Friday in March, eighteen hundred and forty-eight.

Road and bridge laws in Mercer county, to be decided on by ballot.

SECTION 58. That the township line between Spring and Beaver townships, Crawford county, be changed in the following manner, to wit:—Commencing on the township line now dividing the aforesaid townships, at the Erie county line, where the aforesaid Spring and Beaver townships line intersects with said Erie county line, for a distance of one mile; thence south, running parallel with the east line of Beaver township, until it intersects the north line of Conneaut township; and all persons living in the bounds of the territory thus added, are to be considered, on and after the first Tuesday of March, eighteen hundred and forty-eight, as belonging to Spring, and shall constitute a part of Spring township, in like manner as other citizens of said township; and that James M'Dowell, jr., Calvin Gates and E. R. Hall, of Crawford county, are hereby appointed commissioners to survey, mark and define the line hereby authorized to be located, and make a report of the same, and file it in the prothonotary's office of Crawford county; and they shall receive a reasonable compensation for their service so rendered, which shall be paid by the township of Spring.

SECTION 59. That from and after the passage of this act, it shall and may be lawful for the collectors of Columbia township, Bradford county, to elect annually, at their usual place of electing township officers, one qualified citizen, who shall serve as constable for said township, subject to the same rules and regulations as constables are now by law regulated; and so much of the second section of an act, approved the fourth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-one, as authorizes the election of two constables in said township, be and the same is hereby repealed.

M.; and that the seventy-seventh section of the act, entitled "An Act regulating election districts," approved seventh day of March, one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, and all acts and supplements conflicting with the provisions of this section, be and the same are hereby repealed.

- Northumberland.** SECTION 70. That the qualified voters of Upper Mahanoy township, in the county of Northumberland, shall hereafter hold their general and township elections at the house of Peter Beisel, in said township.
- York.** SECTION 71. That the qualified voters of Monaghan township, in the county of York, shall hold their township and general elections at the house of George Pollinger.

That the general elections in Lower Delaware ward, in the city of Philadelphia, shall be held at one window in front of the state house, in said city; and that part of any act heretofore passed, dividing said ward into precincts, for general election purposes, be and the same is hereby repealed.

That so much of the act, approved the third day of April, one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, as relates to the streets, lanes and alleys in the town of Donaldson, in the county of Schuylkill, be and the same is hereby repealed.
- Vacancies in the board of commissioners of Spring Garden, to be supplied by special election.** SECTION 74. That in case four or more vacancies shall, by death, resignation or otherwise, occur in the board of commissioners of the district of Spring Garden, in the county of Philadelphia, such vacancies shall be supplied by a special election, to be called by the said board of commissioners, by giving fifteen days' notice, by handbills posted in the most public places within said district; and such election shall be conducted by the officers who conducted the last previous election, and the proper returns made in the manner and form as is now directed by law; and all laws inconsistent herewith, are hereby repealed.
- Sullivan.** SECTION 75. That the qualified voters of Shrewsbury township, in Sullivan county, be and they are hereby authorized to hold their general, special and township elections at the house of George Eakins, in said township.

AN ACT

To enable William Kiehner, guardian of John Mannon, to sell certain real estate.

WHEREAS, John Mannon, a minor, aged nine years, and only child and heir of Thomas Mannon, late of the borough of Schuylkill Haven, in Schuylkill county, deceased, intestate, is entitled to certain real estate, situate in the said borough, part of which real estate he holds as tenant in common, and part as coparcener :

And whereas, Some of the said real estate is unproductive, and it would be for the benefit of the said minor that it should be sold ; therefore,

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That* William Kiehner, guardian of the said John Mannon, is hereby authorized to sell, at public or private sale, the whole or any part of the real estate of the said John Mannon, situated in the said borough of Schuylkill Haven, for the best price that can be obtained, and to execute, acknowledge and deliver a deed or deeds in fee simple therefor, to the purchaser or purchasers : *Provided, That no such deed shall be made until the said guardian shall make report of the sale to the orphans' court of Schuylkill county, and the same shall be approved of and confirmed by the said court ; and the said guardian shall have given security, to be approved of by the said court, for the faithful application or investment of the proceeds of sale, in such manner as the said orphans' court shall legally decree.*
