A N A C T

To authorize George Mish to sell and convey certain real estate.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That George Mish is hereby authorized to sell, at public or private sale, a certain two story brick dwelling house, situate in the borough of Harrisburg, fronting on Front street, and adjoining on the east a lot now in the possession of Valentine Hummel, late the estate of Jacob Mish, deceased; and said sale so as aforesaid made, being first approved by the orphans' court of Dauphin county, shall, upon payment of the purchase money to the said George Mish, be good and valid, to convey to the purchaser all the estate vested in said decedent in said property at the time of his decease: Provided, That before the said orphans' court shall approve of any sale so as aforesaid made by the said George Mish, he shall file a bond to the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in such sum and with such security as the said court shall direct and approve of, conditioned for the faithful appropriation of the said purchase money, under the direction of the said court, to the person or persons entitled to the same; and upon his paying the said purchase money, after deducting costs, expenses and his reasonable compensation, according to the decree of the said court, such payment shall be a final discharge to him from the liabilities and duties of the said trust: Provided further, That if the said George Mish shall refuse or neglect to perform the duties hereinbefore imposed upon him, the said orphans' court, upon the application of any person interested, shall have power*

to appoint some suitable person in his stead, upon his giving security as aforesaid.

AN ACT

Authorizing the laying out of a state road from New Castle, in Mercer county, thence to Rockville, thence to West Liberty, thence to Sunbury, thence to North Washington, thence to Fairview, all in Butler county, thence to the Great Western iron works, in Armstrong county.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, 'That* James Oliver, of Mercer county, John H. Thompson, of Butler county, and John Gilchrist, of Armstrong county, be and they are hereby appointed commissioners to view and lay out a state road from the borough of New Castle, in Mercer county, thence to Rockville, thence to West Liberty, thence to Sunbury, thence to North Washington, thence to Fairview, all in Butler county, thence to the Great Western iron works, in Armstrong county.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the said board of commissioners, or a majority of them, after taking and subscribing an oath or affirmation before a justice of the peace, to perform the duties enjoined upon them by this act, with impartiality and fidelity, to carefully view the ground over which said road may pass, and lay out the same on the nearest and best ground to a straight line, and in no place to exceed an elevation of five degrees.

Duty of commis-
sioners.

SECTION 3. That it shall be the duty of said commissioners, plainly and distinctly to mark the ground on the routes agreed upon for the road aforesaid, in such manner as to enable the supervisors readily to find the same; and for the purpose of fulfilling the duties in this act enjoined, the said commissioners are hereby authorized to employ, at a per diem allowance not exceeding one dollar each, two chain carriers and one axeman; and the said commissioners, respectively, shall receive a per diem allowance not exceeding one dollar and fifty cents each, for each day necessarily expended in the discharge of the duties enjoined by this act; and the said commissioners performing the duties of surveyor, shall have and receive an additional compensation of one dollar per day for each and every day spent in the laying out of said road, to be paid in the manner and form as hereinafter directed.
