## A SUPPLEMENT

To an act, entitled "An Act to incorporate the Kensington steamboat and navigation company," approved the seventh day of April, one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine.

Proviso.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That* so much of the charter of the Kensington steamboat navigation company, incorporated by an act passed the eleventh day of April, one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine, as prohibits the said company from engaging in the conveyance of passengers, or the transportation of merchandize to and from Philadelphia, and any other point or points on the Delaware river, or bay, be and the same is hereby so amended as to permit said company hereafter to engage in the conveyance of passengers, or the transportation of merchandize to and from Philadelphia, and any point on the Delaware bay at or beyond the break-water: *Provided, That* nothing contained herein shall be construed to authorize or permit said company to carry passengers or merchandize to and from Philadelphia, and any intermediate point or place on the Delaware river or bay, northward of the break-water; and any provisions in said charter inconsistent herewith is hereby repealed.

## AN ACT

To incorporate the Morrisville cemetery association.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That* Daniel Moon, William Taylor, Isaac Parsons, junior, Evan L. Moon, Henry S. Morris, Andrew Crozer, Hutchinson Moon, David W.

Kelly, Lewis R. Appleton, George Bailey, George Justice, Joel Wright and John H. Lovett, and their associates, and all and every the persons who are or may hereafter become members of the association, styled the "Morrisville cemetery association," and their successors, shall be and they are hereby created and declared a body corporate by the name and style of the "Morrisville cemetery association," and by that name shall have perpetual succession, and shall be capable in law to hold and dispose of property, to sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded in any court of law or elsewhere; to ordain, pass and put in execution all such by-laws, rules and regulations, not contrary to the constitution and laws of the United States, or of this commonwealth, or to this act, as shall be necessary and convenient for carrying into effect the object of this association, and generally to do all and singular the matters and things which shall lawfully appertain to them to do for the improvement and ornament of the grounds, and due management and regulation of the affairs of said cemetery.

SECTION 2. The object for which this corporation is created, is to establish a cemetery or burial place for deceased human bodies, in a lot of ground situated near Morrisville, in Bucks county, on the westerly side of the Penn's Manor road, containing between one and two acres more or less, which has been purchased and surveyed for the above named cemetery; and the lots in said cemetery owned by purchasers shall be a qualified inheritance; that is to say, to descend as other real estate to heirs.

SECTION 3. The affairs of said company shall be conducted by a board of five managers, to be elected from among and by the lot-holders, in such manner and at such times as the by-laws made in pursuance of this act shall specify; and until an election shall be held the persons named in the first section of this act shall act as managers; and furthermore, the managers have power to lay out, arrange and sell burial lots, and that no other than white persons can become members of this association, or be interred in said cemetery; and furthermore, at any time if a surplus fund shall accrue from the proceeds of the sale of burial lots, it shall be put out at interest until it amounts to five hundred dollars, which sum shall be a perpetual fund to be put out at lawful interest, on bond and mortgage by the managers; and the said interest shall be laid out as far as necessary in the repairs and ornament of said cemetery; that is to say, the interest aforesaid is to be expended on the first purchase of one acre and a fraction of an acre.

SECTION 4. That the grounds of said cemetery which shall at no time exceed twelve acres, shall be exempt from taxation, except for state purposes; and the lots in said cemetery shall not be subject to attachment or execution: *Provided*, That the said exemption from attachment or execution shall not extend to more than four lots of the size laid out and held by any one individual.
