AN ACT

To incorporate the Medico-Chirurgical college of Philadelphia.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That James Bryan, Charles M. Peery, John Chapin, Lee Buffington and Thomas Brinckle, doctors of medicine, now associated together under the name, style and title of "The Medico-Chirurgical college of Philadelphia," be hereby themselves and successors, created a body politic and corporate, in deed and in law, by the name, style and title aforesaid; and by the same name they shall have perpetual succession, and all and singular the privileges, immunities and franchises incident to a corporation; and shall be capable of taking and holding, to them and their successors, in fee simple or for any lesser estate, as much lands, tenements and hereditaments, and other real and personal estate and property, as shall be needful and necessary to effect all and singular the objects, intents and purposes of their institution and association; which said objects, intents and purposes are now defined in their printed constitution, in the words following, to wit: The dissemination of medical knowledge, the defence of the rights and the preservation of the repute and dignity of the medical profession, and of suing and being sued, and of doing and performing all and every other act or acts, thing or things, which a body politic or corporate may or can lawfully do or perform, connected with the objects of this corporation.

Privileges.

Power to grant diplomas, &c.

SECTION 2. That the said corporation shall have power to grant diplomas of fellowship, honorary membership, senior membership and junior membership, but this grant shall not be construed into the grant

of any power to confer the degree of bachelor of medicine or doctor of medicine; and that the said corporation shall have the full power to enact and enforce such constitution and by-laws as they shall deem proper for its government, and for the better carrying out and effecting the objects, intents and purposes hereinbefore recited, and to make, use and have a common seal, and the same to break, alter and renew at pleasure; and shall have power to elect such officers, and at such times as they may deem proper: *Provided*, That the constitution, by-laws, ordinances, and all acts of said corporation, shall not be contrary to this charter, nor to the constitution or laws of the United States, or of this commonwealth. Proviso.

SECTION 3. That no enumeration of powers, privileges and duties herein contained, shall be so construed as to exclude others not enumerated, which are necessary to the fulfilment of the designs and purposes of this act, and not inconsistent with its express provisions and limitations. Other privileges.

SECTION 4. The legislature hereby reserves the power to alter, revoke or annul the charter of the said college, whenever, in their opinion, it may be injurious to the citizens of the commonwealth; in such manner, however, that no injustice shall be done to the corporators. Reservation.

AN ACT

To incorporate the New Brighton female seminary.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That there shall be and is hereby established in the borough of New Brighton, Beaver county, a seminary or public school for the education of young ladies, by the name, style and title of "The New Brighton female seminary," under the care and direction of seven trustees, who, and their successors in office, shall be and are hereby declared to be one body politic and corporate in deed and in law; and by the aforesaid name, style and title shall have perpetual succession, and shall be capable in law to sue and be sued, to have a common seal, and the same to alter and renew at pleasure; and shall be capable to take, hold and purchase for the use of said seminary, lands, goods, chattels, moneys, of any kind whatsoever, by gift, grant, conveyance, devise or bequest from any person or persons whomsoever capable of making the same; Incorporate.
