AN ACT

To refund to Charles Macalester an over-payment made by him into the state treasury.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the state treasurer be and he is hereby authorized and required to refund to Charles Macalester, one hundred and twenty-five dollars and fourteen cents, being an over-payment made by him to the register of wills in Philadelphia county, in paying the collateral inheritance tax on a certain amount of Pennsylvania five per cent. stock, in the name of Adam Black, deceased.

AN ACT

To abolish special courts in Fayette county, and to transfer the causes therein depending into the court of common pleas.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the first section of an act, entitled “An Act to authorize the president judge of the district court of Allegheny county, to hold special courts in Fayette county in certain cases, and for other purposes,” passed sixteenth April, eighteen hundred and thirty-eight, be and the same is hereby repealed; and that all the causes which have heretofore been transferred into said special court, and have not yet been finally adjudicated, be and the same are hereby re-transferred into the court of common pleas of said county; and all causes which have been, or may hereafter be removed from said special court into the supreme court, wherein a venire facias de novo has been or may hereafter be awarded by the

supreme court, shall return to the court of common pleas of said county and be tried therein.

AN ACT

Regulating election districts.

- Boundaries.** **SECTION 1.** *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That beginning at a post on the Clarion county line, one and one-half miles south of the north-west corner of North Porter township; thence east to Perry township line; thence north three and one-half miles to a post; thence west to the Clarion county line; thence south to the place of beginning; all within the boundary described, be and the same is hereby erected a new election and school district, to be called Beaver; and that John M'Amrich, John Heath and Robert R. Means are hereby appointed commissioners to run and mark the lines of said election district, the expenses of which shall be paid out of the treasury of Jefferson county.
- Beaver election district erected.** **SECTION 2.** The qualified electors of Beaver election district shall hold their township and general elections at the house of D. D. Wonderleih, in Heathville, said district, and that the time of holding the township elections shall be the first Monday in February, in each year; and that D. D. Wonderleih act as judge. John H. Hilderbrand and Charles Jacox as inspectors, to hold the township elections for one thousand eight hundred and fifty, which shall be holden on the first Monday in June.
- Place of holding elections.** **SECTION 3.** The north end of Porter township, as divided by the courts of Jefferson county, be and the same is hereby called Ringgold; and the qualified electors thereof shall hold their general and township elections at the house of Philip Shannon, in said township, and that John M'Amrich act as judge, and John M'Elheiny and John C. Tuguson as inspectors, to hold the township elections for one thousand eight hundred and fifty, which shall be holden on the fourth Monday in April next; and that the township elections shall be holden on the fourth Monday in February, in each year thereafter.
- North end of of Porter township, in Jefferson county, to be called Ringgold.** **SECTION 4.** All acts inconsistent with the third section of this act are hereby repealed.
