

county of Clinton, be and the same is hereby repealed, so far as the same relates to the townships of Logan and Greene, in said county.

SECTION 4. That the commissioners of M'Kean county are hereby authorized, if they deem it necessary and proper, to appropriate from the funds of said county, the sum of one thousand dollars, for the repair and improvement of that part of the public highway leading from Tunongwant creek, in Bradford township, in said county, to the Allegheny river in Eldred township, which lies between the east line of Bradford township aforesaid, and the saw mill known as the Beardsly mill, on Foster creek, in said township of Bradford; the money so appropriated to be expended under the direction of said commissioners: *Provided*, That not more than one-third of said sum shall be appropriated and expended in any one year. Commissioners of M'Kean county, for the recertain powers granted to.

SECTION 5. That Grinfell Blake and his associates, be and are hereby authorized to construct a dam across the Clarion river, for milling purposes, at or near Beach bottom, in Elk county: *Provided*, The same shall not be built over three and an half feet above low water mark, and subject to the provisions and penalties as are provided for by an act passed thirtieth of March, eighteen hundred and forty-six, entitled "An Act in relation to the obstruction of the Clarion river, and for other purposes." Grinfell Blake and associates authorized to construct a dam across the Clarion river.

SECTION 6. That the following creeks, viz: from the mouth of Beaver creek to the mouth of Killbuck creek; from the mouth of North Beaver Dam run to Gill's saw mill; from the mouth of Slate Lick run to the Philipsburg road; from the mouth of Beaver Dam creek to the place the township road crosses it; all in the county of Cambria, be and the same are hereby declared to be public highways. Mouth of Beaver creek and Killbuck, &c., declared public highways.

A SUPPLEMENT

To an act relating to inspections, passed the fifteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five; in relation to path-masters in Erie county; the appointment of a flour inspector in Luzerne county; and to tavern licenses in Philadelphia city and county.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same*, That Flour inspector, the governor is hereby authorized to appoint an inspector of flour and borough of Erie.

meal, who shall reside in the borough of Erie, whose duty it shall be, under the laws of this state for inspecting flour and meal, to inspect the flour of wheat, flour of rye, and meal made of Indian corn, and stamp upon the barrel or cask containing the same, if he approves of the flour or meal as merchantable, the letters B E.

Powers.

SECTION 2. That the said inspector shall have like powers and privileges, and be subject to like liabilities, and receive the like fees, as the inspectors of flour and meal appointed under existing laws for the city of Pittsburg and county of Allegheny.

Flour liable to inspection.

SECTION 3. That all flour which shall be brought from any state into the county of Erie, for the purpose of being offered for sale within the said county, shall be liable to the like inspection and regulations as flour manufactured within said county.

Path-master, Erie county, duties of.

SECTION 4. That the path-masters of the respective road districts of Erie county, shall hereafter be required to settle their accounts, verified by oath or affirmation, with the road commissioners of their respective townships, and the same penalties as is provided in the act of general assembly relating to the roads of Erie county, on the first Monday before the third Friday in March, of each and every year; and in case of any vacancy in the office of path-master, by death, resignation or otherwise, the road commissioners of the proper township shall fill the same by appointment, until the next annual election.

Town clerk to make out duplicate of road tax.

SECTION 5. That it shall be the duty of the town clerk to make out a duplicate of all the road tax to be collected in money, and deliver the same to the collector of the county rates and levies of the respective township, whose duty it shall be to collect and pay over the same, for the same rate of compensation, and under the same penalties as is now provided by law for the collection of county rates and levies; and all other acts and parts of acts as are inconsistent herewith, are hereby repealed.

Inspection of beef and pork, relative to.

SECTION 6. That so much of the act, entitled "An Act relating to inspections," passed the fifteenth of April, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five, and the supplements thereto, as prescribes the manner of packing, branding and inspecting salted beef and pork, of the state of Pennsylvania, designed for ship stores or exportation, be and the same is hereby repealed; and hereafter the same shall not be liable to inspection unless at the request of the owner or purchaser thereof.

Inspector of wheat flour, Pittston, Luzerne county.

SECTION 7. That after the passage of this act, it shall be the duty of the governor of this commonwealth to appoint one suitable person as inspector of wheat flour in the township of Pittston, Luzerne county, whose duty it shall be to inspect, at the request of the purchasers, all wheat flour offered for sale in the said township of Pittston, and who shall receive as his fees for such duty, the sum of three cents per barrel; and so much of the act, entitled "An Act relating to inspectors," passed the fifteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five, as requires the inspectors of wheat flour in the borough of Pottsville, Schuylkill county, with the several provisions, penalties and liabilities relating thereto, be and the same is hereby extended to the said township of Pittston; and it is hereby further provided, that the said inspector shall, if he approves of the flour submitted to his examination as merchantable, stamp the casks and plugs used by him as aforesaid, with the letters T P.

Tavern licenses, Philadelphia city and county, relative to.

SECTION 8. That nothing in the fourteenth section of the act of the sixteenth of April, one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine, entitled "An Act to change the mode of granting tavern licenses in the city and county of Philadelphia," shall be construed to prevent the prosecution by indictment, within said city and county, of persons selling spirituous

liquors by less measure than a quart without license, or to require any other specification of the time of the commission of said offence, than has heretofore been required in indictments for keeping tippling houses, in the courts of the state.

AN ACT

To incorporate the Waynesburg college, in Greene county, state of Pennsylvania.

WHEREAS, Certain persons, holders of a lot of ground in the borough of Waynesburg, Greene county, with a large building in the process of erection thereon, designed for educational purposes, have manifested a desire to place the same when completed and ready for use under the control of the Pennsylvania Presbytery, of the Cumberland Presbyterian church of the United States, upon the condition that a college shall be started, in which at least three professorships shall be sustained by said Presbytery; therefore,

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That there shall be, and hereby is established, in the borough of Waynesburg, Greene county, state of Pennsylvania, a college or public school for the education of youth in the English and other languages, literature and the useful arts and sciences, by the name and style of "The Waynesburg college;" the said college to be under the direction, management and government of seven trustees, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, and which trustees and their successors, shall be and they are hereby declared to be a body politic and corporate, in deed and in law, by the name, style and title of "The Waynesburg college;" and by such name shall have perpetual succession, and shall be able to sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded, in all courts of law and equity; and shall be capable in law and equity, to take, hold and purchase for the use of said college, lands, goods, chattels, moneys, of any kind whatsoever, by gift, grant, conveyance, devise or bequest, from any person or persons whatsoever, capable of giving or making the same; and the same from time to time to sell, convey, mortgage or dispose of, for the use of said college; to erect any buildings that may be necessary, and generally to do all and singular
