AN ACT

To annul the marriage contract of Fithian J. Clark and Theresa Clark, and for the erection of a bridge over the Kiskiminetas river.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same.* That the marriage contract entered into between Fithian J. Clark and Theresa Clark, his wife, be and the same is hereby annulled and made void, and the parties released and discharged from all duties, liabilities and obligations arising therefrom, as fully and absolutely as if they had never been joined in marriage.

SECTION 2. That the provisions of the act, entitled "An Act to authorize the governor to incorporate sundry bridge and turnpike road companies, and for other purposes," approved the eighth April, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-three, relative to the erection of a bridge over the Conemaugh river at Livermore, be and the same are hereby revived and continued in force as fully, to all intents and purposes, as if every section in said act contained relating to said bridge were hereby re-enacted: *Provided*, That the duties to be performed by the commissioners named in the fifty-fifth section of said act shall be done and performed by John Gallaher and John Leard, of Indiana county, and John Gallaher, of Westmoreland county.
