AN ACT

To annul the marriage contract between John M'Neil and Hester Ann, his wife.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the marriage contract entered into between John M'Neil, of Washington county, and Hester Ann, his wife, be and the same is hereby declared null and void, and the parties discharged from all obligations and liabilities growing out of the same, as full and absolutely as if they had never been joined in marriage.*

A N A C T

To annul the marriage contract between Henry Kempf and Eveleen, his wife.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the marriage contract entered into between Henry Kempf and Eveleen, his wife, be and the same is hereby annulled and made void, and the parties released and discharged from the said contract, and from all duties and obligations arising therefrom, as fully and effectually as if they had never been joined in marriage.

SECTION 2. That any child now born or within the space of three months to be born of the bodies of the said Henry and Eveleen Kempf, shall have and enjoy all the rights and privileges of a child born in lawful wedlock, and shall be able and capable in law to inherit and transmit any estate whatsoever, as fully and completely, to all intents and purposes, as if such child had been born in lawful wedlock.
