

CHAPTER CXXIX.

An ACT for the relief of John Lewis.

WHEREAS it hath been represented to the Legislature, that John Lewis late a serjeant in the eleventh Pennsylvania regiment, commanded by Col. Richard Humpton, was enlisted on the seventh of June, one thousand seven hundred and seventy-seven, and as it appears that said Lewis hath not received his pay from the first of June, one thousand seven hundred and seventy-eight, to the first of November next following, and it being just and reasonable that his services should be fully recompensed: Therefore,

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,

That the accounting officers be, and they are hereby directed to settle up the arrearage of pay due to serjeant John Lewis, from the first of June, one thousand seven hundred and seventy-eight, to the first of November next following, with interest and the amount thereof shall be paid to said Lewis, on a warrant to be drawn by the Governor, out of any unappropriated money in the treasury of this commonwealth.
