

Clause (9), subsection (b), section 828, act of May 1, 1929, P. L. 905, added May 26, 1949, P. L. 1884, amended.

Section 1. Clause (9) of subsection (b) of section 828, act of May 1, 1929 (P. L. 905), known as "The Vehicle Code," added May 26, 1949 (P. L. 1884), is amended to read:

Section 828. School Buses; Safety Requirements.—

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(b) No person shall own or operate a school bus carrying school children on the highways of this Commonwealth in a school bus that, in addition to the other requirements of this act, does not conform with the following:

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(9) Every school bus shall, [be equipped with two electrical or mechanical stop signal devices, one to the front and one to the rear thereof, in addition to the stop signal devices otherwise required by this act.] *in addition to any other equipment and distinctive markings required by this act, be equipped with one signal lamp visible from the front and one other visible from the rear, each showing a flashing red light. Each lamp shall be mounted as high as practicable upon the body of the bus.* Each such additional device shall be plainly visible to operators of approaching vehicles in normal sunlight and at night from a distance of one hundred (100) feet to the front or rear, as the case may be, shall not project a glaring light, and shall be of types approved by the secretary.

AN ACT

Amending the act of May 4, 1927 (P. L. 519), entitled "An act concerning boroughs, and revising, amending, and consolidating the law relating to boroughs," providing for the term of office of a borough manager to be determined by the borough council.

The Borough Code.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby enacts as follows:

Section 1140, act of May 4, 1927, P. L. 519, reenacted and amended July 10, 1947, P. L. 1621, and amended July 19, 1951, P. L. 1026, further amended.

Section 1. Section 1140, act of May 4, 1927 (P. L. 519), known as "The Borough Code," reenacted and amended July 10, 1947 (P. L. 1621), and amended July 19, 1951 (P. L. 1026), is amended to read:

Section 1140. Borough Manager May Be Created By Ordinance; Election.—The council of any borough may, at its discretion, at any time, create by ordinance the

office of borough manager and may in like manner abolish the same. While said office exists, the council shall, from time to time, and whenever there is a vacancy, elect, by a vote of a majority of all the members, one person to fill said office, [who shall serve until the first Monday of January of the even-numbered year succeeding his election and until his successor qualifies,] subject [however] to removal by the council at any time by a vote of the majority of all the members.

### AN ACT

Amending the act of May 4, 1927 (P. L. 519), entitled "An act concerning boroughs, and revising, amending, and consolidating the law relating to boroughs," providing for the treasurer and secretary of borough council to be appointed instead of elected, and providing for the term of office of certain appointed officers and employes, including the street commissioner and the borough solicitor to be determined by the council.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby enacts as follows:

Section 1. Section 1001, act of May 4, 1927 (P. L. 519), known as "The Borough Code," reenacted and amended July 10, 1947 (P. L. 1621), and amended October 21, 1955 (P. L. 710), is amended to read:

Section 1001. Organization of Council; Quorum; Compensation; Eligibility.—The borough council shall organize at eight o'clock post meridian on the first Monday of January of each even-numbered year, by electing a president, [treasurer, and secretary] which shall constitute the organization of council. The council may at the organization meeting elect such other officers as may be provided for by law or ordinance, or as may be deemed necessary for the conduct of affairs of the borough. The president shall preside over the meetings of council and, when absent, his place shall be filled by a president pro tempore. A majority of the entire membership of council shall constitute a quorum. The councilmen may receive compensation to be fixed by ordinance at any time and from time to time as follows: In boroughs whose population is seven hundred fifty (750) or less, a maximum of five dollars (\$5) a month; in boroughs whose population is more than seven hundred fifty (750) and not more than fifteen hundred (1500), a maximum of ten dollars (\$10) a month; in boroughs whose popula-
