AN ACT

To amend section one of an act, approved the twenty-fifth day of June, one thousand eight hundred ninety-five (Pamphlet Laws, two hundred seventy-five), entitled "An act dividing the cities of this State into three classes with respect to their population, and designating the mode of ascertaining and changing the classification thereof in accordance therewith."

Section 1. Be it enacted, &c., That section one of an act, approved the twenty-fifth day of June, one thousand eight hundred ninety-five (Pamphlet Laws, two hundred seventy-five), entitled "An act dividing the cities of this State into three classes with respect to their population, and designating the mode of ascertaining and changing the classification thereof in accordance therewith," which reads as follows:—

Section 1, act of

"Section 1. Be it enacted, &c., That for the purpose of legislation, regulating their municipal affairs, the exercise of certain corporate powers, and having respect to the number, character, powers, and duties of certain officers thereof, the cities now in existence and those hereafter created in this Commonwealth shall be divided into three classes:

"Those containing a population of one million or over shall constitute the first class.

"Those containing a population of one hundred thousand and under one million shall constitute the second class.

"Those containing a population under one hundred thousand shall constitute the third class," is hereby amended to read as follows:—

Section 1. Be it enacted, &c., That for the purpose of legislation, regulating their municipal affairs, the exercise of certain corporate powers, and having respect to the number, character, powers, and duties of certain officers thereof, the cities now in existence and those hereafter created in this Commonwealth shall be divided into three classes:

First class.

Those containing a population of one million or over shall constitute the first class.

Second class.

Those containing a population of one hundred *and twenty-five* thousand and under one million shall constitute the second class.

Third class.

Those containing a population under one hundred *and twenty-five* thousand shall constitute the third class.
