the prothonotary of the court of common pleas of the county or counties in which he or she desires to practice, by exhibiting to the prothonotary of said county or counties a license duly granted to him or her as hereinbefore provided, whereupon he or she shall be entitled, upon the payment of one dollar, to be duly registered in the office of the prothonotary of the court of common pleas of said county or counties as an osteopathic surgeon.

Every license issued by said board to practice sur- Effect of license. gery shall authorize the holder thereof to practice major or operative surgery as taught and practiced in the legally incorporated, reputable colleges of osteopathy; and the use of anaesthetics, antiseptics, narcotics, and germicides, when used for the purposes, in the manner, and to the extent, only as taught and practiced under surgical procedure in the legally incorporated, reputable colleges of osteopathy, shall not be considered the practice of medicine, or in violation of any of the laws relating to the practice of medicine or regulating rublic health.

Any osteopathic physician who has been practicing operative surgery for a period of not less than [five] seven years, prior to the passage of this act, shall not be required to take the examinations required by this section, and shall be eligible to appointment as a member of the Osteopathic Surgeons' Examining Board.

## AN ACT

Relating to the destruction of cancelled or unused bonds or other evidences of indebtedness of this Commonwealth.

Section 1. Be it enacted, &c., That the Governor, the Auditor General, and the State Treasurer are hereby authorized and directed from time to time to destroy any bonds or other evidences of indebtedness of this Commonwealth which shall have been cancelled by the Sinking Fund Commissioners or by the Board of Finance and Revenue or by any other agency of this Commonwealth which may now or hereafter be authorized by law to cancel bonds or other evidences of indebtedness of this Commonwealth.

Section 2. The Governor, the Auditor General, and the State Treasurer are also authorized and directed from time to time to destroy any bonds or other evi-

dences of indebtedness of this Commonwealth which shall have been printed and shall remain unused, prior to the maturity dates thereof.

When to be destroyed.

Section 3. The destruction of bonds or other evidences of indebtedness, as authorized and directed by this act, shall be accomplished as promptly as possible after the cancellation of bonds or other evidences of indebtedness or after the maturity dates of any unused bonds, or other evidences of indebtedness, shall have been passed, as the case may be.

## AN ACT

Relating to raising forest tree seedlings and transplants by inmates of penal and correctional institutions of the Commonwealth, and authorizing their purchase by the Department of Forests and Waters.

Department of Welfare.

Employment of itumates of penal and correctional institutions for raising forest tree seedlings.

Section 1. Be it enacted, &c., That the Department of Welfare of the Commonwealth shall have the power to employ inmates of the Eastern Penitentiary, the Western Penitentiary, the Pennsylvania Industrial Reformatory at Huntingdon, and such other penal and correctional institutions of this Commonwealth as it may deem proper, for the purpose of raising forest tree seedlings and transplants on the grounds of the said institutions or grounds adjacent thereto. Such inmates so employed shall be physically capable of such
