AN ACT

Directing the Department of Military Affairs to select, procure, furnish, and award certain decorations, medals, and badges.

Department of Military Affairs to select and procure badges, medals. Section 1. Be it enacted, &c., That the Department of Military Affairs of the Commonwealth shall select, procure, furnish, and award the following decoration, medals, and badges. The detailed specifications and design shall be selected by the Department of Military Affairs, and they shall be awarded and distributed in accordance with rules and regulations to be adopted by said department:

- (a) A Pennsylvania Cross for Valor, a decoration to be awarded to members of the Pennsylvania National Guard or of the Organized Reserves, or Regular Army attached thereto, for acts of bravery, courage, valor or heroism above the ordinary gallantry of other members of the Military Service.
- (b) A Service Medal to be awarded to members of the Pennsylvania National Guard, or of the Organized Reserves or Regular Army attached thereto, for any period of active service in an emergency within the Commonwealth.
- (c) A Meritorious Service Medal to be awarded to either a member of the military or naval forces of the United States, not necessarily in the Pennsylvania National Guard, or to deserving civilians in recognition of meritorious service rendered to the Commonwealth.
- (d) A Markmanship Badge to be awarded to civilians or to members of the military or naval forces of the United States, not necessarily in the Pennsylvania National Guard, who as individual competitors or as members of a team in rifle or pistol matches win first, second or third place in any State, Interstate, National or International Matches.
