AN ACT

Creating a State World's Fair Commission; defining the powers and duties of said commission; providing for participation in the New York Worlds Fair; and making an appropriation.

State World's  
Fair Commission  
created.

Section 1. Be it enacted, &c., That a commission is hereby created, to be known as the State World's Fair Commission. The commission shall be composed of five citizens to be appointed by the Governor. The commission shall organize, at the call of the Governor, by electing a chairman, vice-chairman, and secretary. The secretary need not be a member of the commission.

The members of the commission shall not receive any compensation for their services, but shall be reimbursed for all expenses incurred in the performance of their duties.

Employes of the  
commission.

The commission shall have power to employ such assistants, clerks, and other employes as may be deemed necessary, and to fix their compensation and the compensation of the secretary.

Quorum.

Three members of the commission shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Duties of the  
commission.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the commission to provide for full participation by the Commonwealth in the World's Fair to be held in the City of New York during the year one thousand nine hundred and thirty-nine; to provide for exhibits showing the agricultural, industrial, coal mining, scientific, and the scenic and historic interests of the Commonwealth; to cooperate with agencies of the State Government, and political subdivisions thereof, and with private interests, in providing and arranging such exhibits; to obtain space for such exhibits by lease or by the erection and construction of a proper building through the Department of Property and Supplies in the manner provided by the Administrative Code of one thousand nine hundred twenty-nine, and its amendments; and to do all such other acts as may be deemed necessary or appropriate by the commission to enable the Commonwealth and the

people thereof to be represented at said World's Fair, commensurate with the importance of the Commonwealth.

Section 3. The sum of seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby specifically appropriated to the State World's Fair Commission for the payment of the expenses of the members of the commission, for the compensation and expenses of the secretary and other employes, for the leasing of exhibit space, for the erection, construction, and equipment of a building, for providing exhibits, for light, heat, power, postage, telephone, telegraph, freight, and express charges,\* for automobile hire, and for all other incidental expenses deemed necessary by the commission to carry into effect the provisions of this act.

AN ACT

To amend the act, approved the eighteenth day of May, one thousand nine hundred and eleven (Pamphlet Laws, three hundred nine), entitled "An act to establish a public school system in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, together with the provisions by which it shall be administered, and prescribing penalties for the violation thereof; providing revenue to establish and maintain the same, and the method of collecting such revenue; and repealing all laws, general, special or local, or any parts thereof, that are or may be inconsistent therewith," requiring medical inspectors to make eye and ear tests annually; providing for the use of scientific apparatus furnished by school districts; and providing for certain instruction in State teachers' colleges, for the appointment of certain experts in the Department of Public Instruction; and making an appropriation.

Section 1. Be it enacted, &c., That the act, approved the eighteenth day of May, one thousand nine hundred and eleven (Pamphlet Laws, three hundred nine), entitled "An act to establish a public school system in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, together with the provisions by which it shall be administered, and prescribing penalties for the violation thereof; providing revenue to establish and maintain the same, and the method of collecting such revenue; and repealing all laws, general, special or local, or any parts thereof, that are or may be inconsistent therewith," is hereby amended, by adding thereto a new section to read as follows:
