a maximum of fifteen dollars (\$15) a month; in boroughs whose population is more than twenty-five hundred (2500) and not more than five thousand (5000), a maximum of twenty dollars (\$20) a month; in boroughs whose population is more than five thousand (5000) and not more than ten thousand (10,000), a maximum of fifty dollars (\$50) a month; and in boroughs whose population is more than ten thousand (10,000), a maximum of [twenty-five dollars (\$25)] one hundred dollars (\$100) a month.

The population shall be determined by the latest United States decennial census or by two and one-half $(2\frac{1}{2})$ times the number of registered voters in the borough. No compensation shall be paid in any month to a councilman who has failed to attend at least one regular meeting of council during the month. A school director shall not be eligible to the office of member of council.

AN ACT

Amending the act of June twenty-five, one thousand nine hundred forty-seven (Pamphlet Laws 928), entitled "An act relating to the annual salaries and compensation of certain county officers of counties of the sixth class," changing salaries of district attorneys in counties of the sixth class.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby enacts as follows:

Section 1. Section one, act of June twenty-five, one thousand nine hundred forty-seven (Pamphlet Laws 928), entitled "An act relating to the annual salaries and compensation of certain county officers of counties of the sixth class," amended October eleven, one thousand nine hundred fifty-one (Pamphlet Laws 1704), is amended to read:

Section 1. The annual salaries of the following county officers of counties of the sixth class shall be as follows:

The clerk of the court of quarter sessions, four thousand dollars (\$4000).

The treasurer, four thousand eight hundred dollars (\$4800).

The controller, five thousand dollars (\$5000).

Sixth class counties.

Section 1, act of June 25, 1947, P.L. 928, amended October 11, 1951, P.L. 1704, further amended. The clerk of over and terminer, one thousand one hundred dollars (\$1100).

The clerks of the orphans' court, three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3500) each.

The prothonotary, five thousand dollars (\$5000).

The recorder of deeds, four thousand four hundred dollars (\$4400).

The register of wills, four thousand dollars (\$4000).

Where any of the officers above mentioned holds two or more of said offices, he shall receive the highest salary fixed for any of the offices which he holds and the additional salary of seven hundred fifty dollars (\$750).

The sheriff, five thousand dollars (\$5000).

The county commissioners, five thousand dollars (\$5000) each.

The district attorney [shall receive annual salaries depending upon the population of the county as follows:

(a) Less than sixty thousand, three thousand seven hundred dollars (\$3700).

(b) Sixty thousand and more but less than seventy thousand, three thousand seven hundred fifty dollars (\$3750).

(c) Seventy thousand and more but less than eighty thousand, four thousand two hundred fifty dollars (\$4250).

(d) Eighty thousand and more but less than ninety thousand, four thousand seven hundred fifty dollars (\$4750).

(e) Ninety thousand and more but less than one hundred thousand], five thousand dollars (\$5000).

The jury commissioners shall each receive seven dollars and fifty cents (\$7.50) for each day necessarily employed in the discharge of their duties. The said compensation shall be paid from the county treasury in the same manner as the salary or compensation of other county officers and employees.

Section 2. Section two hundred forty-six, act of May two, one thousand nine hundred twenty-nine (Pamphlet Laws 1278), known as "The General County Law," and its amendments, are repealed in so far as they relate to salaries of district attorneys in counties of the sixth class.
