Local authorities in counties, cities, boroughs, incorporated towns, townships and school districts, may, at their discretion, place or cause to be placed and used within school zones, warning figures commonly known as silent policemen, on highways and State highways within such political subdivisions, subject, however, to the following conditions:

- (1) A school zone shall be a distance not exceeding one hundred (100) feet from the nearest boundary of the schools grounds in any direction.
- (2) No such warning figure shall be left in place on any highway, except for the period beginning one (1) hour before school convenes and ending one (1) hour after school adjourns.
- (3) No such warning figure shall be placed on any highway in conflict with any rule or regulation adopted and promulgated by the Secretary of Highways under section 1105 of this act.
- (4) The Secretary of Highways with reference to State highways and local authorities in counties, cities, boroughs, incorporated towns and townships with respect to highways under their jurisdiction, may, in their discretion, determine the proper placing and location of such warning figures.

AN ACT

Amending the act of December 15, 1959 (P. L. 1779), entitled "An act relating to fish; and amending, revising, consolidating and changing the law relating to fish in the inland waters and the boundary lakes and boundary rivers of the Commonwealth," further regulating the use of nets.

The Fish Law of 1959.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby enacts as follows:

Section 95, act of December 15, 1959, P. L. 1779, amended. Section 1. Section 95, act of December 15, 1959 (P. L. 1779), known as "The Fish Law of 1959," is amended to read:

Section 95. Nets Not to Be Used in Certain Places.— No net, except a gill or net fastened to and supported by poles driven in the ground and known as a pound-net, shall be set, fastened, drawn or used within sixteen miles from the entrance to any bay nor within one-half mile from either side of the mouth of any stream.

No gill-net or pound-net shall be set, fastened, drawn or used within two miles of the entrance of any bay.

No net of any character shall be set, fastened, drawn or used within three-fourths of a mile from shore, measured in a direct line, and no gill-net shall be set, fastened, drawn or used within one and one-half miles from shore, measured in a direct line.

The foregoing parts of this section shall be effective except where the Commission, by regulation, shall otherwise provide as a result of a determination by it that modification is desirable from a fish management standpoint, in which event the Commission's regulation shall prevail.

A person violating any provision of this section shall, on conviction as provided in chapter 14 of this act, be subject to a penalty of one hundred dollars (\$100.00), or imprisonment in the county jail for a period of three months.

Section 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

AN ACT

Amending the act of June 3, 1937 (P. L. 1225), entitled "An act concerning game and other wild birds and wild animals; and amending, revising, consolidating, and changing the law relating thereto," changing the bag limit in certain cases.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby enacts as follows:

The Game Law.

Section 1. Sections 502 and 705, act of June 3, 1937 (P. L. 1225), known as "The Game Law," amended June 28, 1957 (P. L. 398), are amended to read:

Section 502. Bag Limits.—(a) It is unlawful for any person to kill or attempt to kill, or have in possession, in any one day or in any one season, unless otherwise provided in this act or by resolution of the commission, more game birds or game animals than fixed by resolution of the commission, or in lieu thereof as hereinafter enumerated:
