Amending the act of March 10, 1949 (P. L. 30), entitled "An act relating to the public school system, including certain provisions applicable as well to private and parochial schools; amending, revising, consolidating and changing the laws relating thereto," excluding music from supplies of the second class.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby enacts as follows:

Public School Code of 1949.

Section 1. Section 805, act of March 10, 1949 (P. L. 30), known as the "Public School Code of 1949," amended May 24, 1951 (P. L. 397), is amended to read:

Section 805, act of March 10, 1949, P. L. 30, amended May 24, 1951, P. L. 397, further amended.

Section 805. Classes of School Supplies; Purchasing Agent.—School supplies shall be divided into two classes. The first class shall include school desks, chairs, furniture, typewriters, and school apparatus. The second class shall include all other supplies, except maps, music, globes and textbooks necessary for school use, not included in the first class. The board of school directors in any district may authorize or appoint the secretary of the board or other executive as purchasing agent for the district, with authority to purchase supplies of either class costing less than three hundred dollars (\$300).

Amending the act of April 12, 1951 (P. L. 90), entitled "An act relating to alcoholic liquors, alcohol and malt and brewed beverages; amending, revising, consolidating and changing the laws relating thereto; regulating and restricting the manufacture, purchase, sale, possession, consumption, importation, transportation, furnishing, holding in bond, holding in storage, traffic in and use of alcoholic liquors, alcohol and malt and brewed beverages and the persons engaged or employed therein; defining the powers and duties of the Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board; providing for the establishment and operation of State liquor stores for the payment of certain license fees to the respective municipalities and townships, for the abatement of certain nuisances and, in certain cases, for search and seizure without warrant; prescribing penalties and forfeitures; providing for local option, and repealing existing laws," authorizing payments for liquor and malt or brewed beverages with checks and drafts on banks, banking institutions, trust companies and similar depositories; penalizing the issuance of worthless checks by certain licensees and requiring reports of such checks to the
