institutions, the purchase of replacement or additional equipment and machinery other than passenger motor vehicles, and all other incidental costs and expenses including payment to the Department of Property and Supplies of mileage charges for the use of automobiles and of expenses or costs of services incurred through the Purchasing Fund.

- Section 7. Purchase of supplies, materials and equipment shall not be deemed to be committed or encumbered until contracts covering said purchases have been entered into with the vendors.
- Section 8. In addition to the amounts appropriated by this act, moneys received in payment for food and household supplies furnished to employes and other persons, except inmates by an institution, shall be paid into the General Fund and are hereby appropriated out of the General Fund to the several respective institutions for the operation and maintenance of said institutions.

Further, in addition to the amounts appropriated by this act, all moneys received from the Federal government, or from any other source as contributions for the programs provided herein, shall be paid into the General Fund and are hereby appropriated out of the General Fund for the purposes of the respective appropriations.

- Section 9. That part of all appropriations in this act unexpended, uncommitted and unencumbered as of June 30, 1963, shall automatically lapse as of that date.
- Section 10. The provisions of this act shall be severable. If any provision of this act is found by a court of record to be unconstitutional and void, the remaining provisions of the act shall, nevertheless, remain valid unless the court finds the valid provisions of the law are so essentially and inseparably connected with and depend upon the void provision that it cannot be presumed the Legislature would have enacted the remaining valid provisions without the void one, or unless the court finds the remaining valid provisions standing alone are incomplete and are incapable of being executed in accordance with the legislative intent.

Section 1. The sum of four million fifty-eight thousand thirty-eight dollars (\$4,058,038), or as much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby specifically appropriated to the Department of Health for payments to municipalities and municipality authorities toward the cost of main-

taining, repairing, replacing, and other expenses relating to sewage treatment plants an amount not to exceed two per centum of the cost (1) for the acquisition and construction of the sewage treatment plants by the municipalities and municipality authorities to control stream pollution expended by the municipalities and municipality authorities from the effective date of the act of June 22, 1937 (P. L. 1987), up to and including the thirty-first day of December of the year preceding the year in which the payment is made as ascertained by the Secretary of Health and approved by the Governor as provided by the act of August 20, 1953 (P. L. 1217), entitled "An act providing for payments by the Commonwealth to municipalities which have expended money to acquire and construct sewage treatment plants in accordance with the Clean Streams Program and the act, approved the twenty-second day of June, one thousand nine hundred thirty-seven (Pamphlet Laws 1987), and making an appropriation," and (2) for the repair, improvements or additions since 1937 of plants constructed prior to that date.

Section 2. Within the meaning of this act, the word "construction" shall include, in addition to the construction of new treatment works, pumping stations and intercepting sewers which are an integral part of the treatment facilities, (including those intercepting sewers of municipalities which collect at least fifty per cent of the sewage of the municipality which enters a public sewage system in the municipality and discharge same into the collection system of the municipality which has constructed the main sewage plant), the altering, improving or adding to of existing treatment works, pumping stations and intercepting sewers which are essential to the sewage treatment plant system.

Section 3. If any section, sentence, clause or part of this act is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, the decision of the court shall not affect or impair any of the remaining provisions of this act. It is hereby declared as the legislative intent that this act would have been adopted had such unconstitutional sentence, section, clause or part thereof, not been included herein.

Section 4. This act shall take effect July 1, 1962.

A SUPPLEMENT

To the act of April 1, 1863 (P. L. 213), entitled "An act to accept the grant of Public Lands, by the United States, to the several states, for the endowment of Agricultural Colleges," making an appropriation for carrying the same into effect.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby enacts as follows:

Section 1. In order to carry into effect the act of Congress, approved July 2, 1862, granting public land to the several states for educational purposes, and subsequent acts of Congress related thereto, and the act of the Legislature of Pennsylvania accepting the provisions and conditions of said acts of Congress and pledging the faith of the State to carry the same into effect, the sum of twenty million dollars (\$20,000,000), or as much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby specifically appropriated to the trustees of the Pennsylvania State University for the fiscal year July 1, 1962, to June 30, 1963, for the following purposes and in the amounts as shown:

- (1) For the general maintenance of instruction, research and extension in the College of Agriculture, the Mont Alto State Forest School, the College of Business Administration, the College of Engineering and Architecture, the College of Liberal Arts, the College of Home Economics, the College of Mineral Industries, the College of Chemistry and Physics, the College of Education, the Graduate School, the College of Physical Education and Athletics, the General Extension Services and for the general maintenance of other schools, departments, offices and services, including repairs and improvements to the grounds and buildings, service of light, heat, power, water and sewage disposal, salaries and wages, materials, supplies, equipment, books and periodicals, insurance and interest, and such other expenditures as the trustees may deem necessary and practicable, but the total sum of such expenditures shall not exceed nineteen million seven hundred and seven thousand seven hundred dollars (\$19,707,700).
- (2) For the purpose of carrying on research and investigation to discover by-products of anthracite and bituminous coal and uses therefor, of developing new scientific, chemical, industrial, domestic and other uses and new and extended markets for anthracite coal and its products, and for employing engineers, chemists, technical experts, assistants, clerks, stenographers and other employes and purchasing such machinery, supplies, equipment, apparatus and other things necessary in the furtherance of the aforesaid research and investigation to be used by the College of Mineral Industries under the supervision of the State Department of Mines and Mineral Industries. Monies shall be expended for this purpose only to the extent that a sum equal to fifty per centum of thirty-seven thousand eight hundred dollars (\$37,800), the amount to be expended by the Commonwealth, is contributed to the Pennsylvania State University by the members of the anthracite and bituminous coal industry. Affidavits evidencing

such contributions shall be submitted by the University to the Auditor General.

- (3) For the purpose of carrying on research and investigation of long-range problems affecting the mineral industries. No more shall be expended for this purpose than may be required to match an equal sum contributed to the University by one or more industries for such research and investigation. The total contribution by the Commonwealth shall not exceed thirty-one thousand fifty dollars (\$31,050). Affidavits evidencing such contributions shall be submitted by the University to the Auditor General.
- (4) The support of research and investigation of basic problems affecting the slate and other nonmetallic mineral industries, eighteen thousand nine hundred dollars (\$18,900).
- (5) For the support of research and investigation of long-range basic problems affecting the mineral industries, seventeen thousand five hundred fifty dollars (\$17,550).
- (6) For the use of the College of Agriculture for expenditure by the Agricultural Experiment Station for the support of research and investigation directed toward the development and production of superior strains of crops and livestock and to develop more efficient methods of producing and marketing such products, eighty-one thousand dollars (\$81,000).
- (7) For the maintenance and the support of research and experimental investigation on problems relating to the petroleum industry of the State, fifty-four thousand dollars (\$54,000).
- (8) For the use of the School of Agriculture for expenditure by the *Agricultural Experiment Station for the erection of experimental mushroom houses and research in the communicable diseases of mushrooms and other phases of the mushroom industry, twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000).
- (9) For the use of the School of Agriculture for expenditure by the Agricultural Experiment Station for research and investigation of mastitis in the dairy cattle, twenty-seven thousand dollars (\$27,000).
- Section 2. Eight per centum (8%) of all General Fund revenues actually received during the fiscal period 1961-62 in excess of the estimated total General Fund revenues available for appropriation for the said fiscal period amounting to one billion twenty-three million eight hundred fifty-four thousand dollars (\$1,023,854,000), as certified by the Secretary of Revenue on September 12, 1961, according to law, are hereby specifically appropriated to the trustees of the Pennsylvania State University for the fiscal year July 1, 1962, to June 30, 1963, for the purposes provided in subsection (1) of section 1 of this act not to exceed, however, the sum of \$1,500,000.

The sum of three million fifty-eight thousand three hundred thirty-five dollars (\$3,058,335), or as much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby specifically appropriated to the Trustees of the University of Pittsburgh for the fiscal year July 1, 1962, to June 30, 1963, for the general maintenance of the University of Pittsburgh and for the purchase of such apparatus and equipment as the trustees may deem necessary for the best interest of the University.

Section 2. The sum of one million thirty-three thousand two hundred dollars (\$1,033,200), or as much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby specifically appropriated to the Trustees of the University of Pittsburgh for the fiscal year July 1, 1962, to June 30, 1963, for the general maintenance of the School of Medicine, including the purchase of such apparatus and equipment as the trustees may deem necessary and maintenance of teaching facilities in hospitals for students of the School of Medicine, including the Maternity Dispensary and other dispensaries.

Section 3. The sum of fifty-two thousand dollars (\$52,000), or as much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby specifically appropriated to the Trustees of the University of Pittsburgh for the fiscal year July 1, 1962, to June 30, 1963, for the general maintenance of the Library School and for the purchase of such equipment as the trustees may deem necessary for the best interest of the University.

Section 4. The sum of twenty-seven thousand eighty-three dollars (\$27,083), or as much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby specifically appropriated to the Trustees of the University of Pittsburgh for the fiscal year July 1, 1962, to June 30, 1963, for a Professorship in Experimental Medicine in the School of Medicine of the University to be known as the Commonwealth Jonas E. Salk Professorship of Experimental Medicine, and to be filled by that member of the medical profession who, in the opinion of the Trustees of the University of Pittsburgh, has made an outstanding contribution in the field of experimental medicine.

Section 2. Any unexpended balance of the appropriation, as determined by the Auditor General, shall be allocated by the Department of the Auditor General among the hospitals, the amounts for which herein specified have not been sufficient to pay for the services rendered by them to persons entitled to free service, in the proportion which the total amount to which each hospital is entitled under the formula set forth in section 1 hereof and for which it has not been paid bears to the total of such amounts of all the hospitals that have not been paid in full. The amount allocated to any hospital shall not be greater than the amount to which the hospital is entitled under the formulae set forth in section 1. All amounts so allocated shall be paid by the department to the hospitals entitled thereto in the manner prescribed by law.

Section 3. Except in cases of accident or emergency, only bona fide residents of Pennsylvania shall be entitled to the free service provided for in this act.

Section 4. All participating hospitals shall file a report with the Department of the Auditor General within ninety days of the last day of each quarter. Failure to file the report timely as required hereunder shall disqualify the institution from receiving an appropriation for the quarter covered by the untimely filed report.

Making appropriations to the Department of Forests and Waters for certain capital improvements in accordance with long range planning for capital improvements designed to make the most effective use of the State's available resources.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby enacts as follows:

Section 1. The sum of six hundred forty-two thousand six hundred and thirty-two dollars (\$642,632), or as much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby specifically appropriated to the Department of Forests and Waters for capital improvement projects for the Forest and Park Services program, including construction of water and

sanitary systems, various types of general improvements and replacement and renovation of facilities at State parks and monuments, construction of roads in State parks and forests, installation of a forest fire radio network and emergency alterations and construction.

Section 2. The sum of eighty thousand two hundred and fifty dollars (\$80,250), or as much thereof as may be necessary, is specifically appropriated to the Department of Forests and Waters for capital improvement projects for the Water Resources Program, including various types of construction and replacement of facilities for the Delaware Canal construction of stream gauging stations and flood control projects and emergency alterations and construction.

Section 3. The sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000), or as much thereof as may be necessary, is specifically appropriated to the Department of Forests and Waters for capital improvement projects for the Pennsylvania State Park and Harbor Commission, for development of picnic sites and emergency alterations and construction.

Section 4. The sum of thirty-five thousand one hundred dollars (\$35,100), or as much thereof as may be necessary, is specifically appropriated to the Department of Forests and Waters for capital improvement projects for the Valley Forge Park Commission, for replacement of plumbing and sewage systems and for emergency alterations and construction, and for revolutionary or colonial period furnishings for historic buildings.

Section 5. The sum of thirteen thousand dollars (\$13,000), or as much thereof as may be necessary, is specifically appropriated to the Department of Forests and Waters for capital improvement projects, for the Washington Crossing Park Commission for park improvements, emergency alterations and construction.

Section 6. Whatsoever of the amounts herein appropriated are unexpended or *unencumbered as of June 30, 1964, shall lapse.

"For the payment of the deficiency in the appropriation for payments to school districts on account of instructional cost of pupil education as provided in Sections 2502 and 2502.2 of the Public School Code of 1949: Provided, That the Superintendent of Public Instruction, with the approval of the Governor, may make payments from this appropriation in advance of the due dates prescribed by law to school districts which are financially handicapped whenever he shall deem it necessary to make such advanced payments to enable school

districts to keep their public schools open \$12,430,172"

I approve this item in the amount of \$3,300,000. I withhold my approval from the remainder of said items including the specific amounts to the school districts named on line 1, page 3 to line 16, page 104, inclusive, for the following reasons:

I am advised by the Attorney General that this item violates a number of constitutional provisions. The most significant constitutional violation relates to Article III, Section 7, which prohibits local or special laws regulating the affairs of school districts, regulating the management of public schools, the building or repair of schoolhouses and the raising of money for such purposes.

Furthermore, the sum of \$9,130,172 would more than consume the anticipated surplus for the current fiscal year. Since this anticipated surplus has been used to balance the budget for the next fiscal year, dissipation of this surplus would throw the Commonwealth again into the morass of deficit financing out of which we have just succeeded in extricating ourselves.

It should be noted that the Legislature has provided in the General Appropriation Act (House Bill No. 1) which I have, this day, signed into law, that the general fund revenues actually received during the current 1961-62 fiscal period in excess of the estimated revenues for this period, as certified by the Secretary of Revenue, will be distributed to the school districts of the Commonwealth in the manner now prescribed by law. Should this condition materialize, the additional monies will be paid under the present reimbursement formula to all of the school districts, not just those enumerated in this bill, and this will be accomplished without unbalancing the budget, thus retaining the fiscal integrity that we have worked so hard to achieve.

The sum of three million four hundred fifteen thousand one hundred thirty-five dollars (\$3,415,135), or as much thereof as may be necessary, from the various funds of the Commonwealth and in the amounts hereinafter listed is hereby appropriated to the Department of Labor and Industry for payment into the Social Security Contribution Fund created under the provisions of the act of January 5, 1952 (P. L. 1833), as re-enacted and amended by the act of June 1, 1956 (P. Making an appropriation to the Department of Health for research at the Lankenau Hospital, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, on problems of aging.

Section 1. The sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) is hereby appropriated to the Department of Health for the fiscal year July 1, 1962, to June 30, 1963, for research at the Lankenau Hospital, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, on the problems of aging.

The sum appropriated by this act shall be used by the Lankenau Hospital to conduct research, both clinical and basic, in the field of aging. Such research shall include (1) an experimental community geriatric clinic for the multidisciplinary evaluation of the aging individual in health and disease with emphasis on preventive health maintenance, early diagnosis of disease, assessment of total performance, capacity fitness for work and retirement, which will be available for all patients who may benefit from the service within the capacity of this clinic, (2) a research ward with beds devoted to controlled nutritional balance studies for specific projects related to chronic diseases of the older individual such as osteoporosis, cardiovascular, aging, connective tissue disorders and disturbances in the skeletal-muscular system, (3) studies on the physiology of aging with particular reference to the development of criteria and practical tests for the assessment of functional capacity and biological aging, and (4) basic biological research with particular reference to such aspects as genetic factors in aging, the role of physical activity in age changes and longitudinal studies covering the entire life span and cellular changes accompanying the aging process.

To implement the provisions of this act the hospital may establish a center for aging research and may for that purpose use the moneys hereby appropriated.

Section 2. The Department of Health shall ascertain that the funds appropriated by this act are used by the Lankenau Hospital for the purposes set forth in the act.
