No. 45-A. AN ACT

To provide for the ordinary expenses of the Executive, Legislative and Judicial Departments of the Commonwealth, interest on the public debt and for public schools for the fiscal year July 1, 1963, to June 30, 1964, and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal period ending June 30, 1963.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby enacts as follows:

Section 1. This act shall be known and may be cited as "The General Appropriation Act of 1963."

Section 2. The following sums, or as much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby specifically appropriated from the General Fund to the several hereinafter named agencies of the Executive, Legislative and Judicial Departments of the Commonwealth for the payment of the salaries, wages or other compensation and travel expense of the duly elected or appointed officers and employes of the Commonwealth, for payment of fees for contractual services rendered, for the purchase or rental of goods, services, printing, equipment, land and buildings, and for payment of any other expenses, as provided by law or by this act, necessary for the proper conduct of the duties, functions and activities and for the purposes hereinafter set forth for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1963, and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal period ending June 30, 1963.

Section 3. This act is not intended to be inconsistent repeal any provision of any act enacted at this or any p	with or to rior session

of the General Assembly regulating the purchase of supplies, the ordering of printing and binding, the purchase, maintenance and use of automobiles, the method of making payments from the State Treasury for any purpose or the functioning of any administrative department, board or commission.

- Section 4. No appropriation made by this act to any department, board, commission or agency of the Executive Department shall be available unless and until such department, board, commission or agency shall have complied with sections 604, 605 and 606 of The Administrative Code of 1929.
- Section 5. The term "employes" as used in this act shall include all directors, superintendents, bureau or division chiefs, assistant directors, assistant superintendents, assistant chiefs, experts, scientists, engineers, surveyors, draftsmen, accountants, secretaries, auditors, inspectors, examiners, statisticians, marshals, clerks, stenographers, bookkeepers, messengers and other assistants in any department, board or commission.
- Section 6. The term "expenses" and "maintenance" shall include all printing, binding and stationery, food and forage, materials and supplies, traveling expenses, training, motor vehicle supplies and repairs, freight, express and cartage, postage, telephone and telegraph rentals and toll charges, newspaper advertising and notices, fuel, light, heat, power and water, repairs or reconstruction of equipment, buildings and facilities, rent of real estate and equipment, premiums on workmen's compensation, insurance premiums on policies of liability insurance covering the operation of permanently assigned automobiles, premiums on surety bonds, premiums on malpractice insurance and medical payment insurance for volunteer workers in State institutions, the purchase of replacement or additional equipment and machinery other than passenger motor vehicles and all other incidental costs and expenses, including payment to the Department of Property and Supplies of mileage charges for the use of automobiles and of expenses or costs of services incurred through the Purchasing Fund.
- Section 7. Purchase of supplies, materials and equipment shall not be deemed to be committed or encumbered until contracts covering said purchases have been entered into with the vendors.
- Section 8. In addition to the amounts appropriated by this act, moneys received in payment for food and household supplies furnished to employes and other persons, except inmates by an institution, shall be paid into the General Fund and are hereby appropriated out of the General Fund to the several respective institutions for the operation and maintenance of said institutions.

Further, in addition to the amounts appropriated by this act, all moneys received from the Federal Government, or from any other source as contributions for the programs provided herein, shall be paid into the General Fund and are hereby appropriated out of the General Fund for the purposes of the respective appropriations.

Section 9. That part of all appropriations in this act unexpended, uncommitted and unencumbered as of June 30, 1964, shall automatically lapse as of that date.

Section 10. The provisions of this act shall be severable. If any provision of this act is found by a court of record to be unconstitutional and void, the remaining provisions of the act shall, nevertheless, remain valid unless the court finds the valid provisions of the law are so essentially and inseparably connected with and depend upon the void provision that it cannot be presumed the Legislature would have enacted the remaining valid provisions without the void one, or unless the court finds the remaining valid provisions standing alone are incomplete and are incapable of being executed in accordance with the legislative intent.

AN ACT

Making an appropriation to the Department of Public Welfare for certain training courses at John J. Kane Hospital and other institutions.

The rehabilitation program conducted at the John J. Kane Hospital can benefit the aged and the institutions caring for them throughout the Commonwealth if the methods used in this program are disseminated.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby enacts as follows:

Section 1. The sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) is hereby appropriated to the Department of Public Welfare for the conduct, operation or contracting for training courses to be given at John J. Kane Hospital and cooperating institutions for the personnel of county homes, nursing and convalescent homes and nonprofit homes for the aged.

APPROVED—The 13th day of August, A. D. 1963, in the sum of \$25,000. I withhold my approval from the remainder of said appropriation because of insufficient State revenue.

AN ACT

Making an appropriation to the commission appointed by the 1963 General Assembly to study the election laws in Pennsylvania.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby enacts as follows:
