purposes not permitted by this act and to cause such sums to be recovered and paid by Temple University to the Treasurer of the Commonwealth. In respect to expenditures made by the university from accounts other than the Commonwealth Appropriation Account, the Auditor General shall have the right to review only and he shall file annually with the General Assembly such information concerning said expenditures as the General Assembly or any of its committees may require. As to the moneys appropriated for the purposes specified in section 1, clauses (2) and (4), the Auditor General shall determine that the required number of full-time Pennsylvania resident students have been charged the specified tuition rate, that the ratio of resident rates to non-resident rates prescribed by section 2 hereof have been maintained, and the bona fides of the residence of those claiming to be Pennsylvania residents.

Section 4. In accordance with the provisions of section 8 of the act known as the "Temple University—Commonwealth Act," act of November 30, 1965 (Act No. 355, P. L. 843), the Treasurer of the Commonwealth shall make payments of the sums appropriated under this act.

Section 5. This act shall take effect July 1, 1966.

HB 203

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby enacts as follows:

Section 1. This act shall be known and may be cited as "The General Appropriation Act of 1966."

Section 2. The following sums, or as much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby specifically appropriated from the General Fund to the several hereinafter named agencies of the Executive, Legislative and Judicial Departments of the Commonwealth for the paylette and the salaries, wages or other compensation and travel expense

of the duly elected or appointed officers and employes of the Commonwealth, for payment of fees for contractual services rendered, for the purchase or rental of goods, services, printing, equipment, land and buildings and for payment of any other expenses, as provided by law or by this act, necessary for the proper conduct of the duties, functions and activities and for the purposes hereinafter set forth for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1966, and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal period ending June 30, 1966.

Section 3. The following sum, or as much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby specifically appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Public Instruction for payments to the school districts for the fiscal period beginning July 1, 1966 and ending June 30, 1968 on account of instructional cost of pupil education as provided in sections 2501, 2502, 2502.2 and 2503.1 of the Public School Code of 1949 and for payment of State and Federal subsidies to school districts and county boards of school directors, for approved vocational education courses, traveling expenses, extension classes and equipment in area technical schools as provided in sections 1802, 1804, 1851, 2504, 2506, 2507, 2508.1, 2508.2, 2508.3, and 2509 of the Public School Code of 1949 and the acts of July 11, 1917 (P. L. 757) and May 11, 1949 (P. L. 1202): Provided, That the Superintendent of Public Instruction, with the approval of the Governor, may make payments from this appropriation in advance of the due dates prescribed by law to school districts which are financially handicapped, whenever he shall deem it necessary to make such advanced payments to enable school districts to keep their public schools open \$425,500,000

In addition to this amount, all moneys received from the Federal Government or from any other source as contributions for this program shall be paid into the General Fund and credited to this appropriation.

Section 4. This act is not intended to be inconsistent with or to repeal any provision of any act enacted at this or any prior session of the General Assembly regulating the purchase of supplies, the ordering of printing and binding, the purchase, maintenance and use of automobiles, the method of making payments from the State Treasury for any purpose or the functioning of any administrative department, board or commission.

Section 5. No appropriation made by this act to any department, board, commission or agency of the Executive Department shall be available unless and until such department, board, commission or agency shall have complied with sections 604, 605 and 606 of The Administrative Code of 1929.

Section 6. The term "employes" as used in this act shall include all directors, superintendents, bureau or division chiefs, assistant directors, assistant superintendents, assistant chiefs, experts, scientists, engineers, surveyors, draftsmen, accountants, secretaries, auditors, inspectors, examiners, statisticians, marshals, clerks, stenographers, bookkeepers, messengers and other assistants in any department, board or commission.

Section 7. The term "expenses" and "maintenance" shall include all printing, binding and stationery, food and forage, materials and supplies, traveling expenses, training, motor vehicle supplies and repairs, freight, express and cartage, postage, telephone and telegraph rentals and toll charges, newspaper advertising and notices, fuel, light, heat, power and water, repairs or reconstruction of equipment, buildings and facilities, rent of real estate and equipment, premiums on workmen's compensation, insurance premiums on policies of liability insurance covering the operation of permanently assigned automobiles, premiums on medical payment insurance and surety bonds for volunteer workers; premiums on employe group life insurance, the purchase of replacement or additional equipment and machinery other than passenger motor vehicles and all other incidental costs and expenses, including payment to the Department of Property and Supplies of mileage charges for the use of automobiles and of expenses or costs of services incurred through the Purchasing Fund. The term "expenses" also shall include the medical costs for the treatment of inmates of State institutions when the inmate must be transferred to an outside hospital: Provided, That in no case shall the State institution pay more for patient care than that provided under the State medical assistance program.

Section 8. Purchase of supplies, materials and equipment shall not be deemed to be committed or encumbered until contracts covering said purchases have been entered into with the vendors.

Section 9. In addition to the amounts appropriated by this act, moneys received in payment for food and household supplies furnished to employes and other persons, except inmates by an institution, and moneys received from the proceeds from the sale of any products of the soil, meats, livestock, timber or other materials sold by the department shall be paid into the General Fund and are hereby appropriated out of the General Fund to the several respective institutions for the operation and maintenance of said institutions.

Further, in addition to the amounts appropriated by this act, all moneys received from the Federal Government, or from any other source as contributions for the programs provided herein or as payment for services or materials furnished by one institution to another, shall be paid into the General Fund and are hereby appropriated out of the General Fund for the purposes of the respective appropriations.

Section 10. That part of all appropriations in this act unexpended, uncommitted and unencumbered as of June 30, 1967, except appropriations made in section 3 of this act, shall automatically lapse as of that date. That part of the appropriation made in section 3 unexpended, uncommitted and unencumbered as of June 30, 1968, shall automatically lapse as of that date.

Section 11. The provisions of this act shall be severable. If any provision of this act is found by a court of record to be unconstitutional and void, the remaining provisions of the act shall, nevertheless, remain valid unless the court finds the valid provisions of the law are so essentially inseparably connected with and depend upon the void provision that it cannot be presumed the General Assembly would have enacted the remaining valid provisions without the void one, or unless the court finds the remaining valid provisions standing alone are incomplete and are incapable of being executed in accordance with the legislative intent.
