Appropriating money from the Sunny Day Fund to the Department of Commerce for various projects throughout this Commonwealth for fiscal year 1987-1988.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby enacts as follows:

Section 1. The sums set forth in this act, or as much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby specifically appropriated from the Sunny Day Fund to the Department of Commerce for the fiscal year July 1, 1987, to June 30, 1988, for the projects listed to enhance economic development and the creation of jobs in this Commonwealth in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 1 of the act of July 1, 1985 (P.L.120, No.32), known as the Sunny Day Fund Act.

Section 2. The following amounts are appropriated to the Department of Commerce to induce companies to locate large industrial, manufacturing or research and development enterprises within this Commonwealth:

(1) For the purpose of making a loan to Swearingen Engineering and Technology, Incorporated, to locate a fanjet aircraft manufacturing facility in Clinton and Lycoming Counties. It is estimated that this project will create approximately 250 jobs during the first three years.

(2) For the purpose of making a loan to Corning	
Glass Works, Incorporated, to locate additional manu-	
facturing operations at its existing facility in Washington	
County. It is estimated that this project will create 200 to	
400 new jobs over the next two to four years.

(3) For the purpose of making a loan to Allegheny	

Particleboard Corporation, to locate a particleboard manufacturing facility in McKean County. It is estimated that this project will create 260 new jobs within the next five years.

(4) For the purpose of making a loan to the Clinton County Industrial Development Corporation, to be used to provide an interest and/or principal guarantee to Avtek Corporation to locate a production facility in Clinton County that will manufacture composite components for a new aircraft. It is estimated that this project will create 375 to 450 new jobs by the third year of the production phase. No funds shall be transferred to the Clinton County Industrial Development Corporation until such time that the corporation certifies to the Department of Commerce, in a form satisfactory to the department, that money from the fund is necessary to satisfy the terms of the interest and/or principal guarantee.

(6) For the purpose of making a loan to Lowengart and Company, Incorporated, to locate additional manufacturing operations at its existing facility in Franklin County. It is estimated that this project will create 180 new jobs within five years.

(7) For the purpose of making a loan to the Scranton Lackawanna Industrial Building Company, to be used to induce the Grumman Corporation, through a loan or interest guarantee, to locate a new product development and manufacturing facility in Lackawanna County. It is expected that this project will create a substantial number of new jobs. No funds shall be transferred to the Scranton Lackawanna Industrial Building Company until such time that the company certifies to the Department of Commerce, in a form satisfactory to the department, that money from the fund is necessary to proceed with the implementation of the project.

It is the intent of the General Assembly that the appropriations in section 2 shall be loaned at an annual interest rate that in no case shall be less than the Pennsylvania Industrial Development Authority's rate for the area in which the project is located and for a term that shall be the same as the term for an equivalent Pennsylvania Industrial Development Authority project. Private companies which receive Sunny Day Fund assistance but fail to make the investment in the enterprise development as specified in section 2 shall be liable for the repayment of all Sunny Day Fund moneys, including any accrued interest thereon and any penalties set by the Secretary of Commerce. Private companies which receive Sunny Day Fund assistance but fail to create the number of jobs specified in the approved loan or other agreements with the Commonwealth shall be liable for a penalty equal to an increase in the interest charged to 2% greater than the current prime interest rate for the remainder of the loan, unless the penalty is waived

by the Secretary of Commerce because the failure is due to circumstances outside the control of the private company. The Secretary of Commerce shall consult with the Chairmen of the Appropriations Committees of the Senate and of the House of Representatives prior to the establishment or waiver of penalties.

Section 4. For a period equal to the term of assistance provided each project approved under this act, the Department of Commerce shall provide a written report on the status of each project to the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives by June 30 of each year. This report shall contain, at a minimum, information pertaining to the specific use of the Sunny Day Fund moneys, the interest rate and term of the Sunny Day Fund loan, the amount of principal outstanding and interest due on the loan, and the number of jobs created by the project. All recipients of funds under this act shall be required to provide any and all information requested by the Department of Commerce for the purpose of this act.

Section 5. No funds under this act shall be awarded by the Department of Commerce after June 30, 1989. Any funds from this appropriation remaining unexpended or unencumbered on June 30, 1989, shall automatically lapse into the Sunny Day Fund.

Section 6. This act shall take effect immediately.

I withhold my approval of this entire item. This Administration has a wellestablished program review process which involves me as Governor, the General Assembly, the Secretary of Transportation, the State Transportation Commission, local governments and the citizens of the Commonwealth in setting priorities for constructing and reconstructing highways in Pennsylvania. To approve a special appropriation for a specific project would set a precedent which would undermine that entire priority-setting process. However, due to the importance of this project to the City of Chester, this project will be given appropriate consideration during the priority-setting process.

I am instructing the Budget Secretary to disregard the conditional language in Section 21 of the bill dealing with the effective date of these appropriations. The language in question reads as follows:

This act shall take effect immediately upon the certification by the Governor to the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the President pro tempore of the Senate that the Department of Public Welfare is taking all steps necessary to comply with the provisions of the act of July 3, 1987 (P.L.459, No.9A), known as the General Appropriation Act of 1987, relative to providing the change for setting net operating ceilings at no less than 115% of the median cost for medical assistance to long-term care facilities. This certification shall be deposited for publication in the Pennsylvania Bulletin.

Article III, § 11 of the State Constitution provides:

The general appropriation bill shall embrace nothing but appropriations for the executive, legislative and judicial departments of the Commonwealth, for the public debt and for public schools. All other appropriations shall be made by separate bills, each embracing but one subject.

This provision has been interpreted by the courts and the Attorney General, in various official opinions, to prohibit substantive language in appropriation bills. Section 21 of the bill before me conflicts with the method established in the Public Welfare Code for determining the rate of reimbursement for nursing homes. The General Assembly may not alter that statutory framework through an appropriation act without violating Article III, § 11 of the Constitution.

Notwithstanding this conclusion, the General Assembly should be advised of the steps taken by the Department of Public Welfare to implement the language included in the General Appropriation Act. Notice of the department's intention to increase nursing home reimbursement ceilings to 115% of median costs was published in the Pennsylvania Bulletin. The department has formally applied for the Federal approval necessary to fund the increase and is awaiting action by the Health Care Financing Administration on that application. Once approval is obtained, the department will move to promulgate regulations to establish the new reimbursement ceiling in accordance with the Public Welfare Code. In the Governor's 1988-1989 budget request pending before the General Assembly, I have requested the State funds necessary to provide this increased reimbursement level for the period July 1, 1988, to June 30, 1989. In the meantime, I have requested and the General Assembly has provided in this bill an additional \$13,785,000 in State funds for current fiscal year nursing home payments.

The Budget Secretary is hereby directed to consider the \$13,785,000 appropriation, and all other approved amounts contained in Senate Bill 938, effective immediately and to take all appropriate steps necessary for payments to be made under each appropriation.
