
 CHAPTER 152.

LAW ABOUT BUOYS IN THE DELAWARE.

Chap: 152 That Not-with-standing the Bay & river of Delaware is greatly commended of those that are acquainted with the same Yet forasmuch as ther hath bin & is Like to be a greater Recourse of Shipping than in times past, To the end that Strangers may not Suffer in Inconveniencie for want of knowledge of the Channell Be it &c: That all Ships & vessells above 12 tons that Shall come to this province & territories shall pay One penny per ton towards the Setting up & maintaining of necessarie buoys in this bay & river of delaware.

 CHAPTER 153.

LAW ABOUT RUN-AWAY SERVANTS.

Chap: 153 To Prevent the Running away of Servants from their Masters or Mistresses Be it Enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That no Servant shall presume to absent from his or her respective Masteer or Mistress or Overseer without Leave or consent And that every Servant So absenting from his or her respective Service, Shall serve 5 days for every days absence, after the expiration of his or her Servitude, And shall further make such Satisfaction for the damages, Costs & charges the said Master or Miistress shall sustain by the absence of the said Servant, as the respective County Court shall See meett.

Confirmed by chapter 154, 1684; chapter 175, 1785; chapter 186, 1688; and chapter 191, 1690. Abrogated in 1693, but accepted in Petition of Right, June 1, 1693, as part of chapter 68.
