CHAPTER 90.

THE LAW AGAINST PERSONS JUDGING IN THEIR OWN CAUSE.

Chapter 147. And to the End that Justice May have its free Cource in this province & Teritories.

Be it Enacted by the Authority aforesaid that no Member of a Court of Justice shall sitt in Judgment while his owne Cause is upon tryall and if an appeal shall at any time be made from the Judgment of a Court to the provincial Judges or to the Governor and Councill it is hereby further Enacted that no Such Judge or Member of Councill shall sit In Judgment upon that appeal

CHAPTER 91.

THE LAW AGAINST ABUSING OF MAGISTRATES.

Chapter 29. Be it Enacted by the Authority aforesaid That if any person speake sleightingly or Carry themselves abuseively against any Magistrate or person in office being duely Convicted thereof shall for Every such offence suffer according to the Quality of the Magistrate and nature of the offence Provided it be not lesse then five shillings nor more then fivety shillings.
