CHAPTER CCCLXXXV.

AN ACT FOR THE CONTINUANCE OF AN ACT OF ASSEMBLY OF THIS PROVINCE, ENTITLED "AN ACT FOR THE MORE EASY RECOVERY OF LEGACIES WITHIN THIS PROVINCE." 1

Whereas an act of the General Assembly of this province, entitled "An act for the more easy recovery of legacies within this province," was passed in the sixteenth year of the present reign, which act on experience hath been found beneficial to the freemen of this province, but the time for which the said act was made is now near expiring by the limitation therein contained:

Therefore to prevent the loss which might otherwise be sustained by the expiration of so usful a law:

[Section I.] Be it enacted by the Honorable James Hamilton, Esquire, Lieutenant-Governor under the Honorable Thomas Penn and Richard Penn, Esquires, true and absolute Proprietaries of the Province of Pennsylvania and the counties of Newcastle, Kent and Sussex upon Delaware, by and with the advice and consent of the representatives of the freemen of the said Province in General Assembly met, and by the authority of the same, and it is hereby enacted, That the act of assembly aforesaid, entitled "An act for the more easy recovery of legacies within this province," be and the same act is hereby continued from the time therein limited for and during the term of seven

years and from thence to the end of the next session of assembly and no longer.

CHAPTER CCCLXXXVI.

AN ACT FOR THE CONTINUANCE OF AN ACT OF ASSEMBLY OF THIS PROVINCE, ENTITLED "A SUPPLEMENTARY ACT TO THE ACT, ENTI-TLED, 'AN ACT FOR PREVENTING THE EXPORTATION OF BREAD AND FLOUR NOT MERCHANTABLE AND FOR THE NEW APPOINTMENT OF OFFICERS TO PUT THE SAID LAW IN EXECUTION.' "1

Whereas an act of the general assembly of this province, entitled "A supplementary act to the act, entitled 'An act for preventing the exportation of bread and flour not merchantable,'" was passed in the nineteenth year of the present reign, which act on experience hath been found beneficial and well adapted to the purposes intended thereby. But forasmuch as the time for which the said act was made is near expiring and it is necessary that a new nomination and appointment of officers be made to put the said law in execution:

Therefore to prevent the injuries which might otherwise be sustained by the loss of so useful an act:

[Section I.] Be it enacted by the Honorable James Hamilton, Esquire, Lieutenant-Governor under the Honorable Thomas Penn and Richard Penn, Esquires, true and absolute Proprietaries of the Province of Pennsylvania and the counties of Newcastle, Kent and Sussex upon Delaware, by and with the advice and consent of the representatives of the freemen of the said Province in General Assembly met, and by the authority of the same, and it is hereby enacted, That Joseph King, of Philadelphia, shall be and hereby is appointed the officer for viewing and examining all flour shipped or intended to be shipped directly out of this province from the city and county of Philadel-
