This act to continue and be in force during the continuance of the act hereinbefore-mentioned, to which it is a supplement and no longer.

## CHAPTER CCCCXIX.

AN ACT FOR THE FURTHER CONTINUANCE OF AN ACT OF GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THIS PROVINCE, ENTITLED "AN ACT FOR THE MORE EASY RECOVERY OF LEGACIES WITHIN THIS PROVINCE." 1

Whereas an act of general assembly of this province, entitled "An act for the more easy recovery of legacies within this province," passed in the sixteenth year of the present reign, being by its own limitation near expiring, by one other act of assembly passed in the twenty-third year of the same reign was continued from thence for and during the term of seven years, and from thence to the end of the next session of assembly and no longer.

And whereas it hath been found on experience to be a necessary and beneficial act, but the term for which it was continued by the limitation therein-contained being now near expiring:

Therefore for preventing the expiration of so useful a law:

[Section I.] Be it enacted by the Honorable William Denny, Esquire, Lieutenant-Governor under the Honorable Thomas Penn and Richard Penn, Esquires, true and absolute Proprietaries of the Province of Pennsylvania and counties of Newcastle, Kent and Sussex upon Delaware, by and with the advice and consent of the representatives of the freemen of the said Province in General Assembly met, and by the authority of the same, That the act of assembly aforesaid, entitled "An act for the more easy recovery of legacies within this province," be and the same act is hereby further continued from the time limited

by the act hereinbefore-mentioned, entitled "An act for the continuance of an act of assembly of this province, entitled 'An act for the more easy recovery of legacies within this province,' "1 for and during the term of seven years and from thence to the end of the next sitting of assembly and no longer.

## CHAPTER CCCCXX.

AN ACT TO RENDER THE QUARTERING OF SOLDIERS ON THE PUBLIC HOUSES OF THIS PROVINCE LESS BURDENSOME.

Whereas by a late act of assembly, entitled "An act for extending several sections of an act of Parliament passed in the twenty-ninth year of the present reign, entitled "An act for punishing mutiny and desertion and for the better payment of the army and their quarters," 2 all the public houses of this province are subjected to the billeting of sodiers quartered within the same, but forasmuch as His Majesty's service hath required and may [hereafter require] that quarters should be allotted in particular parts of the province while other parts remain free from that burden, and the public housekeepers where soldiers are quartered have complained that the numbers billeted upon them are greater than they are able to provide for, no allowance being made them for the lodging, firewood, beer and other necessaries they are by law obliged to supply:

Therefore the better to enable [the] public houses to provide duly for the King's soldiers:

[Section I.] Be it enacted by the Honorable William Denny, Esquire, Lieutenant-Governor under the Honorable Thomas Penn and Richard Penn, Esquires, true and absolute Proprie-
