

CHAPTER DCCXXIII.

AN ACT TO MAKE PERPETUAL AN ACT PASSED IN THE ELEVENTH YEAR OF THE REIGN OF HIS PRESENT MAJESTY KING GEORGE THE THIRD, ENTITLED "AN ACT FOR THE RELIEF OF THE POOR."¹

Whereas an act passed in the eleventh year of the reign of His present Majesty King George the Third, entitled "An act for the relief of the poor,"¹ will soon expire by its own limitation:

And whereas the continuance of the said act will tend to the benefit of the inhabitants of this province:

[Section I.] Be it therefore enacted by the Honorable John Penn, Esquire, Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of Pennsylvania, by and with the consent and advice of the representatives of the freemen of the said province in General Assembly met, and by the authority of the same, That the said act and every clause, matter and thing therein contained, the clause of limitation in the said act only expected, shall be and is hereby continued in full force and made perpetual, anything in the said act to the contrary notwithstanding.

Passed April 6, 1776. Probably not submitted to the Crown for action. See Appendix XXXIII.

CHAPTER DCCXXIV.

AN ACT TO SUSPEND THE CARRYING INTO EXECUTION THE ORDERS OF THE GOVERNOR AND COUNCIL FOR OPENING A CERTAIN ROAD IN THIS PROVINCE.

Whereas in pursuance of an order of the governor and council of this province a certain provincial road or highway has been laid out and confirmed by the authority aforesaid leading
