

## CHAPTER MMCXXI.

AN ACT VESTING ONE OF THE CITY LOTS THEREIN MENTIONED IN TRUSTEES, FOR THE USE OF THE FOURTH PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, IN THE CITY OF PHILADELPHIA.

Whereas the trustees of the Fourth Presbyterian church, in the city of Philadelphia, presented a petition to the legislature, setting forth their inability to purchase a lot of ground to build a church on, and in which to inter their dead, and praying the aid of the legislature by granting one of the city lots, the property of this commonwealth, for the purposes aforesaid. And whereas it is but just and right to promote the cause of religion, and that the virtuous citizens of this commonwealth should have the encouragement of the legislature. Therefore:

[Section I.] (Section I, P. L.) Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That all the right, title and interest of this commonwealth, to the city lot bounded east by Twelfth street, north by Lombard street, west by Thirteenth street, and south by land of Amos Wickersham and Richard Price, containing east and west three hundred and ninety-six feet, and in length or depth north and south seventy-eight feet, shall be, and hereby is, vested in the trustees of the Fourth Presbyterian Church and their successors forever, to and for the sole purpose of building a church thereon, and for the interment of their dead therein, and for no other use, intent or purpose whatsoever.
