CHAPTER MMMVII.

AN ACT GRANTING AN ANNUITY TO JONATHAN GUY.

Whereas it appears that Jonathan Guy was a sergeant in captain Van Zant's company, fifth Pennsylvania Battallion, commanded by colonel M'Gaw, and that he received a wound or wounds, in the service of the United States, on the night preceding the capture of Fort Washington, in November, one thousand seven hundred and seventy-six: And it further appears that after being cured of his wounds, he enlisted in colonel Walter Stewart's regiment, on the twenty-ninth of April, one thousand seven hundred and seventy-eight, and continued in the service until the expiration of the term of his enlistment, to wit, on the sixteenth of January, one thousand seven hundred and eighty-one; and that from old age and an affection of the palsy, he is now unable to provide for himself a subsistence: Therefore,

Section I. (Section I, P. L.) Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the sum of forty dollars be, and the same is hereby granted to Jonathan Guy, to be paid to him, or his lawful attorney, immediately after the passing of this act on a warrant to be drawn by the governor on the state treasurer; and that an annuity of forty dollars be granted for the use of Jonathan Guy, to be paid to John Weber, or his executor or executors, administrator or administrators, his or their lawful attorney, to commence from the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eight, and to be paid half yearly to the said John Weber, or his executor or executors, administrator or administrators, or his or their lawful attorney, on warrants to be drawn by the governor on the state treasurer, which annuity shall be expended by the said John Weber, his executor or executors, administrator or administrators, his or their lawful attorney, in providing clothing and diet for the said Jonathan Guy; and it hereby is made the duty of the said John Weber, his executor or executors, administrator or administrators, his or their lawful attorney, to make an annual return to the orphans' court of Montgomery county, on oath or affirmation, how and in what manner he or they have executed the trust in him or them confided by this act.

CHAPTER MMMVIII.

AN ACT TO ALTER A CERTAIN PART OF THE LINE WHICH DIVIDES THE COUNTIES OF MERCER AND CRAWFORD.

Whereas it has been represented to the legislature that inconveniences have been experienced by certain citizens of the counties of Mercer and Crawford, owing to the manner in which the line that divides the said counties was originally run, because it subjects the owners of the lands through which the said line was run, to pay county rates and levies to the county collectors of both counties, and also to be required by the respective supervisors of the public roads, to work on the same days in both counties: Therefore, for the remedy of such inconveniences in future,

Section I. (Section I, P. L.) Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That from and after the publication of this act, the certain part of the line which has hitherto divided the counties of Mercer and Crawford, be, and the same is hereby altered, and shall be established in the following manner, to wit: Beginning at the northwest corner of a certain tract of donation land, known by its No. 1078, situate on the northwest corner of a section of the fifth donation district, thence southwardly by a tract of land, on which Joseph Bur-
